The democracy is flirting with the women.

At a joint meeting of the Wilson club and county committee last night it was decided to make strenuous efforts to win the favor of the fair sex. To start the movement to gather in the women for Wilson a mass meeting will be held Friday night at Temple of Music.

Steps were also taken looking to the opening of the campaign here. Mayor Cotterill of Seattle was wanted, but could not be secured, so Tom Vance of Olympia will be invited.

A campaign committee was elected with C. R. Jackson, Browder Brown, John D. Fletcher, William Welch and Ervan Staileup on the list.

E. O. Connor, lawyer, who hails from Spokane and wants to be democratic congressman-at-large from Washington, is here building fences. Connor thinks he will get there both in the primaries and in the finals, and that Wilson will sweep the whole state. Anyway, he says that's what he thinks, and he is spending his cash to make a campaign. He will speak at the Woodrow Wilson club dinner tomorrow.

James J. Cameron, representative in the 38th district, who is making the race for re-election on the republican ticket, is going to have plenty of opposition this trip. Cameron in his campaign claims credit for voting for labor legislation, good roads legislation and the initiative, referendum and recall. He is opposed by N. L. Lovell and W. V. Holly as republicans; M. O. Herbes, progressive, and Harry Lewis, socialist. The district takes in all the downtown precincts of the Third ward and the Fourth ward almost complete, and Cameron will probably have trouble with Lewis, the socialist, if he disposes of all the rest, as they have shown a lot of strength in this district. This district is going to make one of the interesting fights in Pierce county in the new split-up.

Debs passed Tacoma by on this trip to the coast, but the socialists will be without orators. August Seidel, candidate for vice president and first socialist mayor of Milwaukee, will be here, and Fred D. Warren, the editor of the Appeal to Reason, whom Roosevelt and Taft have both been trying to hound out of business by using the power of the federal courts and the postal service to crush him, but without success thus far, will also come. Warren is the real hero of the Socialist movement, and is looked upon as a martyr and will probably draw as big a crowd as Debs.

Walter J. Thompson, progressive candidate for county commissioner in the Torgy Peterson district, has issued a novel statement. He says he does not believe in commissioners running on party ticket at all, and that they should be non-partisan like

the judiciary. While he is on the bull moose ticket, he insists that if elected he will forget it. He puts in black type this in his platform: "We must either have lower taxes or get more for what we pay."

A lot of people want this job now, Thompson, H. W. Mahanke and W. H. Finch all being after it on the progressive ticket, with John L. Murray, Mattis Nelson, Eugene Church and George Smith on the republican ticket.

Arthur S. Cory, the Chehalis banker, who is going to contest with R. A. B. Young for the progressive nomination for state treasurer, is in town this week, looking after support. Cory is a native of Wisconsin, married, has two children, belongs to half a dozen lodges and the Methodist church.

In view of the large use for steam rollers in the political affairs of this year, Commissioner Owen Woods thinks the city ought to profit some, so he has posted notice that any politicians or private citizens who want to rent the city's big 12-ton steam roller can get it by paying \$8 a day. For politicians this will be strictly in advance and they must furnish their own fuel.
