## BOB HODGE WILL ADDRESS BIG MEETING HERE MONSTER GATHERING PLANNED FOR BOB NEXT TUESDAY, SEPTEMBER THE 3RD

### PLANTED DYNAMITE, CHARGE AGAINST MILL PRESIDENT

WILLIAM WOOD, PRESIDENT OF ONE OF AMERICA'S BIGGEST TEXTILE MILLS, SURRENDERS TO DISTRICT ATTORNEY TODAY—MUST ANSWER GRAVE CHARGE.

(By United Press Leased Wire.) BOSTON, Mass., Aug. 30.—William M. Wood, president of the American Woolen company, the largest textile concern in the country, surrendered today to District Attorney Pelletier on an indictment charging conspiracy.

The indictment is in connection with the reported "planting" of dynamite during the Lawrence strike by textile officials in an alleged effort to discredit the strikers.

Wood went to police headquarters accompanied by Congressman Samuel Powers, who will probably act as his counsel.

The indictment charged conspiracy, asserting that Wood and other textile officials caused dynamite to be placed in the homes of the striking foreigners at Lawrence for the alleged purpose of injuring the strike of the operatives there. The workers were victorious after one of the most bitter industrial struggles in the history of New England.

Wood was immediately arraigned and was released on \$5,000 bail. District Attorney Pelletier says that he has a good case against the mill owner and is certain of conviction.

The treatment accorded the strikers at Lawrence started the civilized world. Defenseless women and children were brutally beaten by police and militia sent by Governor Eugene N. Foss for the alleged purpose of maintaining order.

A number of strikers were arrested when dynamite was found in their homes. They asserted that the explosives were "planted" by representatives of the mill owners and this charge was also borne out when James Breen recently was convicted of "planting" dynamite given him by Ernest Pittman, member of the firm of W. W. Pittman & Co., one of the largest textile construction mills in the country. An indictment was returned against Pittman, but the latter committed suicide Tuesday afternoon following a conference with District Attorney Pelletier.

ELGIN, Ill., Aug. 30.—Hurrying from Chicago to attend the Illinois automobile trophy race, the first of which was held here today, J. R. Ballinger of Chicago was killed and his brother Leon injured when the machine in which they were riding skidded and overturned.

WENATCHEE, Aug. 30.—King George of England will eat apples grown in the Wenatchee valley, according to London advices to orchardists here today. King George placed orders for a considerable quantity of the Buster Brown variety, a brand of select Wenatchee apples.

### MOTHER AFRAID SON MET WITH FOUL PLAY

MYSTERY IN DISAPPEARANCE OF FLOYD F. McCALLUM, AGED 20 YEARS.

Police and relatives today have begun a search for Floyd E. McCallum, a 20-year-old lad, who seemingly has dropped from the face of the earth.

His mother, who lives at the Harrison hotel, 1306 1-2 South Tacoma avenue, although she is almost prostrated from fear that her son is dead, is bravely taking the lead of the searching party, and will today visit the railroad construction work going on near Stellacom under the supervision of Boyd Brothers, contractors.

It is here that Floyd last worked. A recent pay-day added enough money to his savings to make a total of \$300, which, it is believed, the boy carried on his person.


Mrs. McCallum fears that her boy has been murdered and his body thrown into the sound. It has been three weeks since she last heard from him.

He is described as slender, light complexioned, about 5 feet 7 inches in height, and weighing about 140 pounds. He was employed as a dishwasher.

### MOTHER AND FIVE CHILDREN ARE BURNED TO DEATH

KINGSLAND, N. J., Aug. 30.—Mrs. Rosie Barbara, aged 35 years, and her five children, ranging in age from five months to 12 years, were burned to death early today in a fire which destroyed their home here. Emilio Barbara, the father, and a 1-year old son escaped by jumping from a

second story window. Barbara was first sighted by neighbors standing in front of a window crying that his wife and children were burning to death. Neighbors were unable to locate a ladder and Barbara was forced through by his son Joseph from a window. The lad was caught by a policeman. Barbara then jumped.

### ORDERS DISOBEYED; FOUR PERSONS DIE IN WRECK

PITTSBURG, Pa., Aug. 30.—Four persons were killed near Conway, Pa., today and seven seriously injured when a passenger train on the Pennsylvania railroad, en route to Cleveland collided with a wrecking train. The dead are, Engineer L. Coughenor and three laborers. Several freight cars had been

derailed during the night and the wrecking train was clearing the track when the passenger train crashed into it. A misunderstanding of orders is said to be responsible.

### GOES TO WAKE WIFE; FINDS HER DEAD

MRS. I. IVERSON DIES SUDDENLY AT HER HOME, 3816 NORTH TWENTY-SIXTH ST.

When I. Iverson, of 3816 North Twenty-sixth street, awoke this morning, and went to the room adjoining his own to awaken his wife, he found her in her bed, dead.

Mrs. Iverson had been suffering for some time from a weak heart. Yesterday afternoon she went to the office of Dr. E. M. Brown where she obtained some medicine. On reaching the street she collapsed and had to be taken home.

When he found her dead this morning Mr. Iverson at once notified the police, who called Dr. B. H. Foreman. After an investigation made by Dr. Foreman and Dr. R. H. Slayden, the coroner was called in and the case turned over to him.

He stated that he considered an autopsy unnecessary as from every indication Mrs. Iverson had died from natural causes.

### HERE'S WHAT THE STREET CAR MEN ARE READY TO DO

MADE FOLLOWING SUGGESTIONS AT MEETING WITH CITY COUNCIL YESTERDAY AFTERNOON — FREELAND AUTHORIZED TO COUNT UP NUMBER OF CARS IN SERVICE

Eliminate Tacoma avenue street car line. Put in new machinery and add cars to the cable. Extend Jefferson avenue line to the city hall. Run Eleventh and Stellacom cars down town if the people desire. Add extra cars to prevent overcrowding.

The foregoing propositions the street car company is ready to carry out if the people desire. Manager Bean and Judge Shackelford, representing the company, had a long conference with the city commission yesterday afternoon. Judge Shackelford said the company was eager to please the people. Manager Bean was anxious to do the right thing, he said.

And the idea of the company was to take the cars off Tacoma avenue where they do not pay, put on a few extra cars, add some new machinery to help the cable line and make some minor improvements.

The company was not willing to extend Pacific avenue to Fern Hill. It was willing to run Stellacom and 11th street cars down town if the people desire. F. F. Hopkins was authorized to find out the sentiment of the West Enders.

The average West Enders would prefer instead of running the cars down town that the company put on the extra car it would require to give 10 instead of 20 minutes service.

Commissioner Freeland was authorized by the mayor to check up the company cars and find out how many each car is able to haul decently.

The city will probably pass an ordinance to fix up the whole street car matter.

Manager Bean would not agree to give transfers good on any line but said he would think it over. He will probably agree to it if the council will pass an ordinance making it a crime to try to pass a transfer not within the time limit, as the company wants this.

Bean agreed to get up a letter to the council today telling just what he will do.


