## EVERY BOY HIS OWN TOM EDISON

### HOW TO MAKE A BURGLAR ALARM.

Every boy wants to know how to make a burglar alarm. It is the easiest thing in the world to make a single alarm, but the difficulty is, there are a score of windows and doors in every house by way of which a burglar might enter. Fully to protect a house each one of these entrances ought to be provided with an alarm and that is a bigger job than the average boy would care to tackle.

A few illustrations, however, will show you the principles on which all alarms work, and then you can go as far as you like in fitting up the house with them.

It is presumed that you have an old electric bell or can buy a second hand one for a few cents.


Cut two pieces of cracker-box tin 1x4 inches. (Experiment on the kitchen door.) Screw one of the strips about 2 inches from the floor to the side of the door to which hinges are attached. The other should be screwed to the casing at the same height.

Bend them so that when the door is opened they touch.

Diagram No. 1 will explain how to string your wires. Regular bell wire should be used. The bell and battery can be located in your room if you wish.

An ingenious boy wanted to get a signal when anyone walked into his room. He cut a piece of tin 6x10 inches. He bent it in the middle slightly. Then he selected a spot just over the threshold of his door on which a person would naturally step when entering the room.

He drove five tasks in a circle in the floor at this point, and connected them by a wire. Over this he placed the tin and tacked it down at both ends. He covered the whole thing with a small rug. What he really had was a large pushbutton. When anyone stepped on the part of the rug over the tin it was pressed down and the circuit from the bell was completed.
