CONVICTS MUTINY ON ACCOUNT OF BAD FOOD SERVED

JACKSON, Mich., Sept. 3.—Breaking out of a bull pen in which they were confined following serious riots yesterday 50 convicts in the state penitentiary here today rushed the factory and kitchen of the institution and demolished a great deal of machinery and furniture.
A guard shot one of the prisoners in the arm and the disturbance finally was quelled when the warden called in militia and the fire department. Then the pris-

oners, taken back to their cells, screamed and pounded the bars as a protest against the food served them, which, they declared, was unfit for human consumption.
JACKSON, Mich., Sept. 3.—Mutiny of the convicts in the state penitentiary which started over the quality and amount of food supplied prisoners is reported to be successfully quelled today following the flogging and hanging by the thumbs of the ringleaders.

Only Sergeant Of Police In the World



PORTLAND, Ore., Sept. 3.—The only woman sergeant of police in the world is Miss Della Reed.
Miss Reed was appointed when Sergeant T. J. Casey left the department to enjoy a two weeks' vacation. Ordinarily Miss Reed

acts only as stenographer to Casey and Chief Slover. But when Casey asked for his two weeks leave of absence the chief wanted to know who he thought best could fill his place.
"Miss Reed," was Casey's answer without hesitation, and the young woman was placed in charge.
Miss Reed is somewhere around 25 years old. She refuses to tell the exact date.
She began her career in police work when her parents moved to Portland two years ago and she accepted a position under Mrs. Lola Baldwin, head of the Woman's auxiliary of the Portland police department. So good was her work there that she was transferred to the higher position in the chief's office.

POLITICIAN'S NIECE COMMITS SUICIDE (By United Press Leased Wire.) DENVER, Col., Sept. 3.—After drinking an ounce of carbolic acid, Margaret Haines, aged 25, a niece of A. M. Stevenson, known as "Big Steve," one of the engineers of the Chicago steam roller in the republican national convention, attempted suicide here today. She fought fiercely with the physicians, begging them to let her die. Her condition is critical.
The Stevensons declare they know of no cause for Miss Haines' action, but a love affair is suspected.

KILLED WHILE COUPLING CARS

Crushed into a shapeless mass while coupling cars in the Northern Pacific yards at Seventeenth street and Pacific avenue about 1:30 o'clock this morning, William I. Jacobson, a switchman, was almost instantly killed, dying on the way to the hospital.
No other members of the crew saw the fatal accident and are unable to say just how it occurred. One man, who appeared at the Hoska - Buckley - King parlors, where the remains now are, stated that he believed there was a defect in the airbrake at the point where Jacobson was working.
From cards and letters which were found in the unfortunate man's pockets it was learned that he came here from Idaho. A yard foreman at Pocatello has been notified, and it is hoped Jacobson's people may be located through him.
The dead man was a member of the Moose lodge of Anaconda, Mont., and the Moose organization here has taken temporary charge of the remains. Jacobson was about 40 years old.

SUGGESTS BIG REFORMS FOR SCHOOLS


Five hundred school teachers are gathered today at the Bryant school, where fall institute has opened.
For the most part the morning was taken up by the address of Dr. Charles H. Keene, supervisor of hygiene and physical training in the Minneapolis schools. Dr. Keene's talk was illustrated by picture slides showing modern types of school architecture. Among the reforms he suggests are:
Better sanitation, the lack of which is the cause of hookworm in school children.
Individual seats, not of the bench design.
More windows, with rules for keeping them open.
Lunch rooms, where children may obtain warm lunches at noon.
Mr. Keene's lecture was entitled "Cooking the Child." At the close Walter J. Thompson of Tacoma, presented plants of what is to be America's most perfect country school building, which is to be erected at DeKoven station this fall.

BOB HODGE TALKS TO BIG CROWD IN SOUTH TACOMA

NOONDAY GATHERING GIVES ROUSING WELCOME TO PEOPLE'S CANDIDATE FOR GOVERNOR.
Bob Hodge was right at home at noon today when he stood facing a crowd of several hundred shop men at South Tacoma. It was the kind of a crowd he likes, made up of sturdy toilers.
The politicians were not there. They seldom go to Bob's meetings. For Bob is not in well with the fellows who make a living playing the game against the people.
"We are going to run things differently when I am elected governor," said Bob. "There will be no playing politics, handing out jobs to favorites for the people to pay with their hard earned taxes. There will be no political bosses and when the state pays out a dollar I am going to see the people get a dollar in value for it."
It is along this line that Hodge is kicking on the state militia. He falls to see where the state is getting \$230,000 a year of benefit from the institution. He believes that amount of money ought to produce more for the people.
He told the South Tacoma men where he stands on public questions—for the initiative, referendum, recall—judges too and the other progressive things.
But Bob showed plainly that he stands for not only the progressive platform but a lot more that is simply Bob Hodge personality. And the personality is really more important in this case than the platform for it breathes a humanity that means something for the people.
When he got through talking to those South Tacoma boys it was pretty nearly unanimous in that section for Bob Hodge.

EYE WITNESS TO MURDER FEARS ASSASSINATION

(By United Press Leased Wire.) LIVERPOOL, Sept. 3.—Fears of the members of the police department cause Thomas Coupe, eye witness to the murder of Herman Rosenthal, to announce, late this evening, his determination not to return to the American metropolis and assist District Attorney Whitman to convict the suspected murderers. "I do not believe my life would be safe," he said. "The police are the only ones who would be able to protect me and they are my enemies. I shall remain in England."
Earlier in the day, Coupe, who arrived here on the steamer Lusitania, when approached by the Liverpool police agreed to return to New York and testify against the men whom he says he saw shoot Rosenthal. Arrangements were completed for his return when he suddenly changed his mind. Coupe convinced the authorities that he really believed his life would be in danger in New York and the authorities did not insist that he go back.
