KID MOHLER A SCOUT NOW



ST. LOUIS, Mo., Sept. 3.—When the state progressive convention opened here today it was certain that a complete state ticket would be nominated. All but two of the presidential electors are for Roosevelt. The convention will only adopt a platform, name two men to oppose the Taft electors and then endorse the remainder of the republican ticket.
