TACOMA

There are good points to be found in "The Heart Breakers," as the play is presented by George Damerel and company at the Tacoma theater, but they must be sought for with diligence and hope through a wearisome first act after one has almost begun to doubt.

George Damerel stands out alone. His song, "Your Eyes, Your Smile and You," has one of those tantalizing airs that haunts the memory on the way home and is elusive enough to have slipped away by morning. Mr. Damerel has a good voice, the best of the company.

Miss Myrtle Vail is pretty. She must be pretty for her part. And she must be innocent and demure, all of which she is, but Miss Vail is hardly what the audience expected as a singer.

As for the play itself, it is novel. Present day fathers do not as a general thing lock their beautiful daughter away in a castle, tell her she is not pretty, make her read mathematics and history and geography and travel, and forbid the presence of young men on an occasional evening. Yet this is what Miss Vail is up against.

Mr. Damerel, et al, the "et al" being a group of young bachelors who have been "stung" unmeasurably by the fair ones of their set, finally invade the castle and Mr. Damerel triumphs over a grouchy father and caustic mother after the old folks have been put out of their own home into the rain and the girl consents to the proposal of the man she marries, having first seen him over her right shoulder in the first mirror she has ever looked into.

"The Heart Breakers" will appear again tonight at the Tacoma.

"The Awakening of Helena Richie," a Pennsylvania romance of the early days, with Miss Roselle Knott in the title role, will be the attraction at the Tacoma theater Wednesday and Thursday evenings.

Helena Richie is taken from Miss Margaret Deland's novel and placed before the footlights, with all her sweetness and character strength, by Miss Charlotte Thompson.

"Baby Mine," Wm. A. Brady's international success, which is announced for presentation at the Tacoma Saturday night, was one of the big hits of this house last season and comes with a record of one solid year at Daly's theater, New York, and over a year at the Criterion theater, London.

100 per cent minus 22 per cent equals 78 per cent.
78 per cent equals 1.00.
1 per cent equals 1-78 of 1.00 or 1.28.
90 per cent equals 1.28 or 9-10.
9-10 equals 1.28.
1-10 equals 1-9 of 1.28 or 1.42.
10-10 equals 10 times .142 or 1.42 equals .31.
1.42 minus .31 equals 1.11.
10 per cent of 1.11 equals .11.
1.11 minus .11 equals \$1.

Editor Times: Being a little ambitious on arithmetic I beg to submit the following answer:
The article costs \$1 and we allow a profit of 10 per cent after a discount of 22 per cent for the cost of selling. Therefore 100 plus 10 is the actual selling price. Since 22 per cent is a discount we subtract .22 from 1.00, that is 1.00 minus .22 equals .78. We divide the selling price by 1 minus the difference.
Answer: \$1.41 2-78 or 1.39.

Editor Times: Re your problem in last night's issue, kindly consider the following solution:
Let \$1.00 equal cost.
100 per cent equals profit equals 10 cents, equals 1.10 cost plus profit.
Therefore, 1.10 equals cost and profit after 22 per cent or cost of selling had been deducted. Hence 1.10 equals 78 per cent of selling price.
10 per cent equals 1-78 of 1.10 equals .9141.
100 per cent or selling price equals 1.41.
