Five years ago a poet—a real get-paid-for-his-poems poet, not one of the spring variety—dropped off the train at Houston, Tex. And Houston sat up and took notice. But it wasn't the rhapsody of an immortal epic that struck Houston, Tex., so strenuously; ah, hear me, no! It was the rhythm and meter with which Frank Putnam worked that attracted Houstonians.

First, Poet Putnam smelled the garbage cans ornamenting the streets. A poet's olfactory feelings are easily touched by a garbage can.

"Take those unsightly, unhealthy cans away!" yelled Poet Putnam louder and louder through the columns of his newspaper until they did take the cans off the streets.

"You mustn't use the bull whip on convicts!" sang the poet. And the bull whip was canned.

Then he pitched on Joe Bailey. Texas thought that Bailey was the lastword in statesmanship; Putnam had a different idea; Texas has too, now.

From garbage cans, bull whips and Joe Bailey, Poet Putnam went on to sewers and paving; better lights and better schools; more parks and pure water. With one hand he used poetry; with the other prose, always keeping on harping away until Houston, Tex., is now one of the most progressive municipalities in the great southwest. Also, it's one of the healthiest for the common people.

Now Houston, Tex., has commissioned Poet Putnam as "municipal scout," paying his expenses on a tour of investigation through Europe, where he expects to get his eyes full and his ears full of the things Houston, Tex., and other American cities can do to make life more worth the living.

HODGE, TEATS, DOW SPEAK TO WOMEN

CANDIDATES FOR OFFICE MAKE STRONG ADDRESSES BEFORE WOMEN VOTERS' EDUCATIONAL ASSOCIATION AT Y. M. C. A. YESTERDAY.

Humanity vs. the dollar. That was the case stated by Bob Hodge, candidate for governor, Govnor Teats, candidate for lieutenant governor, and Lorenzo Dow, candidate for prosecutor on the progressive ticket, before the Women Voters' Educational association yesterday afternoon.

The Y. M. C. A. auditorium was filled.

Hodge made a decided hit. "I am not buying the office of governor," he said, referring to the agitation of the republican organs over his small campaign expense account. "I spent \$152 to get the progressive party nomination and not a dollar more. I am simply seeking employment as governor at the hands of the people and I do not expect to buy the office nor forget my employers after they elect me to the job."

Hodge told of his fight with the machine in King county; how the politicians tried to corrupt him and make him a "good dog," promising him wealth and prestige if he would only play the game.

He told how they had offered him the U. S. marshalship, the job of warden of the pen at McNellis island, and three other good federal jobs if he would only pull out of the race for governor, but he declared he was in the race to stay and that he was going to be elected, for the plain people who want honesty and a square deal are with him.

Hodge was cheered enthusiastically by the women.

Govnor Teats told of the legislation he wanted to get through this winter. He related how the rules committee had blocked progressive bills for the general good last session but he was going down this year as lieutenant governor, and he would boss that rules committee and see to it that what the people need they get.

Lorenzo Dow made a plea for the whole progressive ticket, national, state and county.

HE SAYS HE'S GOT IT?

A brain puzzler, a belated successor to "How Old Is Ann?" has been introduced by C. W. Houston, of Los Angeles, Cal. It is this: "An article costs \$1 wholesale. For what will it have to be sold to allow a profit of 10 per cent after deducting 22 per cent for the cost of selling?"

Mr. Houston says the answer is neither \$1.32, \$1.34 nor \$1.43, the three common answers.

Editor Times: In reference to Mr. Houston's mathematical puzzle, wish to submit the following:

\$1 equals cost of article. To be sold for 10 per cent profit it would naturally have to net \$1.10. Therefore \$1.10 equals 78 per cent of actual value, or inverted, would be 110 times 100-78 equals 11000-78. 11000 divided by 78 equals 141 1-39 or \$1.41 1-39. 141 1-39 equals 5500-39. 1 per cent equals 1-100 or 5500-39 or 55-39. 78 per cent equals 78 times 55-39 or 4290-39 or 110, or \$1.10. 22 per cent equals cost of sale. 1 per cent equals 55-39. 22 per cent equals 22 times 55-39 or 1210-39. 1210-39 equals \$1 1-39 or .31 1-39, cost of sale. \$1.10 equals cost plus 10 per cent profit. \$1.10 plus .31 1-39 equals \$1.41 1-39, or what it would have to be sold for.
