THESE ORPHANS TO ENJOY A TURKEYLESS THANKSGIVING

"Mamma Woolsey!" trilled a small voice from the doorway of the Woolsey Children's home. "There's a man here wants to see you, Mamma Woolsey—a funny man. God has painted his hair red." Woolsey home is a great rambling old house that stands atop a hill in the path of wind and rain out on 54th and Sheridan streets. Its curtainless windows stare desolately. It is a bleak, cheerless looking place at this season of the year. But inside Woolsey home is the utmost happiness. Good cheer and love reign in Woolsey home, and "Mamma Woolsey" is its queen. Besides "Mamma Woolsey" there is "Aunt Bessie," who is princess of this royal household, and 16 loyal subjects. It was one of these who announced a visitor whose hair "God had painted red." "Mamma Woolsey" dropped the pan from which she was feeding the great band of ducks that are penned at the back of the Woolsey royal palace, and hastened to the house. She is a fine quaint old lady, 4th hair that is just beginning to turn gray and blue eyes and dear old wrinkles. She wore a blue "Mother Hubbard" and white apron. As she came through the door

she was wiping her hands self-consciously. The visitor's welcome was so warm, the atmosphere so congenial, that he forgot the bleakness of the house standing alone on the hill and ordered silently what Woolsey home would be with "Mamma Woolsey" gone. "A fine band of ducks for your Thanksgiving dinner," commented the visitor. And then and there he became the "observed of all observers" by some dozen pairs of young eyes, blue and black and brown, that had somehow gotten into the room and were seated in an imposing row on the long couch. He had blundered; that was quite apparent. He knows now that every one of those ducks has a name of its own and is in no more danger of being eaten than a human being. For Woolsey home subjects are every one of them vegetarians and a healthier, chubbier, happier lot of youngsters never lived. Thanksgiving dinner at Woolsey home is to be entirely vegetable, bananas and oranges and potatoes and cranberries taking the place of turkey, or, as the visitor had erroneously presumed, duck. SCHRANK PLEADS GUILTY TO SHOOTING ROOSEVELT

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Nov. 12.—John Schrank, who shot Col. Theodore Roosevelt here three weeks ago as the latter was entering an automobile to go to the auditorium for an address, pleaded guilty today to assault with intent to murder. Colonel Roosevelt will be asked to come to Milwaukee to testify against his assailant, if examination shows Schrank to be sane, according to District Attorney Zabel.
