HOME HINTS

CANDY MAKING.

In molding peppermints or other candy keep the hands dusted with confectioner's sugar.

REMOVES FISH SMELL.

To clean a frying pan after fish or onion boil out the pan with soda water, washing clean, then put it on the fire and shake a little oatmeal in.

STOPS STICKING.

To prevent the stopper of a bottle of blue from sticking when replaced rub a fresh one with a little lard or grease of some kind.

FOR THE BATHTUB.

To clean an enameled bathtub wipe it dry and then rub it with a cloth dipped in turpentine and salt. Afterwards wash it with clean, warm water. Then wipe it dry.

IRON RUST.

Remove iron rust from white goods by boiling the articles in water containing cream of tartar. Allow three tablespoons to a gallon.

WAX ON CANDLESTICK.

To remove wax from a candlestick or patent holder put in oven on a piece of newspaper, being careful not to allow them to get too hot. Most of the grease will drip off and be absorbed by the paper.

REMOVES DUST.

A paint brush will remove dust from cracks better than any duster can.
