Creech Sued by Widow of Victim

(By United Press Leased Wire.) ABERDEEN, Dec. 3.—Mrs. Frank Welch, widow of City Detective Frank Welch, who was shot the night of June 3 last by J. S. Creech, filed suit against Creech for damages in the sum of \$35,000 yesterday.

Creech was tried for the murder of Welch last August, his sentence a year in the state prison. He is reported to be wealthy and operates a mill at Raymond. The courts barred much of the sensational evidence that the state wished to introduce at the time and it is said that this will come out in the damage suit, even to naming certain reasons for Creech's animosity toward Welch.

NEW SENATOR SHOWS PLENTY OF FIGHT

(By United Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 3.—Battle to the end against confirmation by the senate of President Taft's appointment of "Injunction Dick" Sloan as federal judge in Arizona was promised here today by Senator Ashurst of the new state. "If the people of Arizona had the opportunity," said Ashurst, "to vote on the nomination of Sloan to the federal bench they would defeat it overwhelmingly. I will oppose Sloan's confirmation to the last, and will also oppose confirmation of other similar nominations, including that of Clinton Howard of Washington."

PEACE OR WAR TO BE DECIDED UPON TODAY

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SOFIA, Dec. 3.—It was definitely stated that the representatives of Turkey and the Balkan allies would this afternoon decide whether to sign the protocols or continue the struggle. ATHENS, Dec. 3.—King George of Greece and his cabinet were closeted for two hours in secret conference here today, after which two messages were sent to M. Gyparis, the Greek minister in Turkey, who is representing Greece in the peace negotiations. CONSTANTINOPLE, Dec. 3.—It was conceded here today that a further delay in signing the protocol for a fourteen days' armistice is ominous. LONDON, Dec. 3.—Greece, Bulgaria and Turkey are seeking to delay peace negotiations, hoping thereby to force more advantageous terms, according to dispatches received here today. VIENNA, Dec. 3.—That Austria is really preparing for war with Serbia and probably with Russia was made more apparent here today with the publication of reports that 100,000 Austrian troops heavily armed and provisioned, have been massed at Semlin, Hungary, opposite Belgrade.

MRS. KOBETICH GETS HER PENSION

Mrs. Louis Kobetich, after several weeks of contention in the city hall over whether she was legally entitled to a pension because of the death of her son who was a fireman, yesterday drew her first \$40 pension from the firemen's fund. According to the vote of the firemen's board she will get this as long as she lives.

SHERIFF WANTS RECOUNT OF BALLOTS

Sheriff Longmire and other defeated candidates have demanded a recount of votes of the last election. According to the official count Longmire lost by 230 votes. Other dissatisfied contestants are George M. Thompson, candidate for justice of the peace, and George A. Ashby and J. J. Price, candidates for constable.

13,000 CHILDREN ARE SELLING STICKERS TODAY

That a summer camp may be built near Tacoma for tuberculosis patients that is why 13,000 Tacoma school children are selling Santa Claus stickers today and all this week. Today the annual sale of Christmas stickers was begun by the Tacoma Anti-Tuberculosis league which has in view the providing of an open-air sanitarium for summer use to be located on the prairie near the city by April 1. "This is the biggest thing we have yet attempted," said Mrs. Christen Quevil, one of the leaders in anti-tuberculosis work here, today. "We need more money than ever and we want everyone to co-operate with us by buying our Christmas stickers. All will need them who send away Christmas packages. Heretofore we have used our money to pay the salary of a visiting nurse. She has done immeasurable good and the people have supported us well, but now there is urgent need of some place where patients can be given the proper care, which means living out of doors." During the sticker sale the street car company will advertise the movement in all cars. Saturday of this week will be the big day. With all the school children of the city invading downtown stores and office buildings, and with women's clubs lending their assistance to the work, the entire city will be thoroughly canvassed. The sale of stickers opened today in the residence section.

TWO HUNDRED AT SEATTLE
