For Mothers of New Babies.
A Safety Pin Book—Young mothers never have enough safety pins. A very pretty Christmas remembrance for the young mother is made of one yard of rose printed ribbon folded in the center over a piece of bone such as you put in collars. This bone has tiny holes along the side. To these attach four leaves of flannel. On each leaf put a card of different sized safety pins. At the top attach baby ribbon so that it can be hung on a basket or pinned on the mother's dress.

Orris Sticks for Teething Babies.
At any drug store you can buy orris wood sticks. Get two of nearly a size and shape as possible. Through the little hole that is always in the end run a ribbon long enough to tie about baby's neck and allow the sticks to hang down so that the baby can see each of them.

Baby's Hot Water Bottle.
Cover a hot water bottle with a crochet cover of soft silk. Make the cover of single crochet. At

Christmas time a hot water bottle is often needed to put at baby's feet when he goes out riding.

Gifts for the Young Girl.
Shoe Trees for Evening Slippers—Buy the metal shoe trees at 25 cents. Sew some ribbon together twice the length of the metal bar and put it on so that it forms a puff tie bow at each of the little wood balls.

Veil Rolls. For these take ribbon 22 inches long and 4 inches wide. Roll a piece of absorbent cotton into a tight cylinder 18 inches long and 4 inches in diameter. Sprinkle with sachet powder and cover with the ribbon. Fringe the ends of the ribbon and tie with narrower ribbon at both ends.

Hat Boxes. If possible obtain some of the wall paper that covers the wall of your friend's room and paste it neatly over a large hat box. This will make the necessary hat box less unsightly in a room where there are no

closets.

For the Invalid.
Have you some dear "shut-in" to remember.

A little night candle in a glass candle-stick with a shade on one side of it will cost 50 cents.

Slippers made of plaited straw and lined with flannel cost only 50 cents.

A small scrap book already gunned with a pair of small scissors tied to it only costs the same and would be appreciated very much by an invalid who likes to collect clippings.

A glass candle-stick on a brass tray will cost 25 cents, and you can add to it a covered china water pitcher and a glass for as much more.

For the Busy Housewife.

Try giving your friend who does her own work a pair of white quilted holders, one on each end of a tape 40 inches long. These can be hung on the apron belt and so will always be handy.

Work Aprons. Make a light calico apron with large bib and strings to tie. Sew coarse rick rack all about the edges to give a pretty finish. Be sure and have a liberal pocket.

Clipping Case. Take the largest white envelopes and make a hole in one corner of as many as you desire and tie them together with a narrow piece of colored leather.

Candies for Xmas

Give a Christmas box of home-made candy!

Such a gift really fits in with the same Christmas idea of the "springs" and other folks who would banish expensive giving. There are always many persons whom we wish to remember at the happy holiday season with some slight token of kindness.

CANDY fills the bill, especially when it is HOME-MADE and prettily wrapped in holiday paper and tied with the silvery string which suggests Jack Frost and crisp Christmas weather.

The girl who wants to send something she has made herself to big brother, can fix up a dandy surprise for him if she knows how to make good candy.

And the boy who has an accommodating sister, whose accomplishments include the art of candy making, may be perfectly at ease if he carries a dainty box of it to the one whom he has mentally singled out as the "prettiest girl" in the class.

Candy is an all round gift. It's always welcome.

Hickory Nut Candy.
This is a recipe which will be wanted wherever the children have hickory nuts. After chopping up half a cupful of nuts boil about a cupful of sugar with a third of a cupful of water and a piece of butter about the size of a walnut. This should cook together until the mixture makes a soft lump when dropped in water. After taking from the fire stir in the nuts and as it grows cloudy-looking pour it into a buttered tin, a little at a time. It spreads out flat.

Vinegar Candy.
If you have two cups of sugar, half a cup of vinegar and about two tablespoonfuls of butter you can make vinegar candy. Melt the butter and then add the sugar and vinegar. This should be boiled until a little dropped in cold water becomes brittle. Turn on a platter which has been buttered. Let it cool. Pull and cut it as you would molasses candy.
