- South End Improvement club meets tonight at 7:30 in South Side hall. All citizens of that district invited to be on hand to suggest ways to improve business conditions in community.

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

INTRODUCE BILLS TO CLEAR ALL LOGGED OFF LANDS IN THIS STATE

OLYMPIA, Jan. 21.—Legislative measures that will mean the beginning of the new era of development in this state, should they be adopted, have been introduced here. Two bills providing for plans whereby logged-off land will be under state development and control have been introduced by Rep. T. K. Robe of Snohomish and Rep. Pierce of Skagit, both of whom were elected on the progressive ticket.

Both bills call for state aid to help settlers clear the wasted lands. In each case the state's credit is to be used, the settlers repaying the state in small long-time installments.

Robe's bill, however, aims to aid those already on logged-off lands. Pierce plans to open up new areas, have the state clear up 10 acres or so, enough to enable new settlers to make a living while continuing the improvement work.

Throughout the state, particularly in western Washington, thousands of acres of logged-off lands lie wasted and barren today which, with proper clearing and improvements, have potential fertility. The progressive party platform calls for state aid. Throughout the recent campaign, Ole Hanson of Seattle and other progressives, talked state-aid for the improvement of logged-off lands. The idea has now grown bigger than a mere party measure. Gov. Lister, in his message, strongly advocated it. Fredrick Bausman of Seattle has written an open letter to the people throughout the state calling for a \$20,000,000 bond issue for the purchase of lands, their development, and to make room, on the easy repayment plan, for the thousands of immigrants who will be here with the opening of the Panama canal.


