

FIRST VIOLATION OF NEW ORDINANCE

Following a plea of guilty on the facts as related in the complaint, Justice Magill in police court Saturday afternoon assessed a fine of \$25 and costs on Oscar Swanson, conductor of the street railway company for overloading his car.

This is the first prosecution under the new ordinance prohibiting loading a street car more than 50 per cent in excess of its seating capacity. The case brought a comment from Judge Magill to the effect that he deemed it advisable that citizens leave the filing of complaints under the law to the city's street car inspector, else there might result

a multiplicity of actions in court, which he deemed inadvisable and not anticipated by the ordinance. He did not pass on the question as to whether the city or public service commission has jurisdiction in the matter of controlling street railway service.

PEDERSON MUST PAY BACK

The city will compel Hans Pederson to pay back \$520 which Engineer Norwood Taylor of the light department says represents work undone by the contractor on the high tension transmission line to LaGrande. Taylor found much slipshod work, poor painting of the poles and utter disregard of the specifications in many instances. The council voted to compel Pederson to pay over the \$520 and then the inspector will be called on to explain his action.




