


GIRL KILLED IN A SEATTLE HOSPITAL; NEGLIGENCE CHARGED

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SEATTLE, Feb. 11.—Miss Claudia Setford, who died Sunday at the Seattle General hospital after falling on the street, strangled to death as the result of being given a glass of milk while lying unconscious in the hospital, according to the findings of the autopsy surgeons.

The milk flowed into her lungs instead of her stomach and her condition prevented her from expelling by coughing. Statements of the hospital authorities that she had a fractured skull, compound fracture of the left arm and broken ribs were disproved. A further investigation is being conducted.

AMERICAN SHOT BY MEXICAN?

TACOMA MAN GEN. DIAZ WOULD RETURN MURDERED IS POLICE FEAR

Believed to have been waylaid in the oil fields in California and robbed of \$1,000 and then murdered, the police of Los Angeles today are seeking to find some trace of Herbert Dexter, a well-to-do Tacoma man who dropped out of sight while looking for an investment for his money in the South.



Dexter left Tacoma several months ago and went to the town of Coalinga, Cal., where he intended to buy a cafe. He had more than \$1,000 in currency in his pocket. He abruptly dropped out of sight, the Los Angeles police learned, and no trace of the man nor his money has been found. The police believe that Dexter was lured to some remote place near Coalinga by two strangers, in whose company he was seen, and killed for the money he had on him. Dexter's wife is at present visiting her relatives in Boston, Mass., and has wired the Los Angeles police to make further efforts to find her husband.

ENGLISH RACE MOURNS LOSS OF SCOTT

LONDON, Feb. 11.—With galleries packed to suffocation, Premier Asquith rose in the house of commons today to speak of the heroic death of Captain Robert Falcon Scott and the four companions who perished with him on his expedition to the South pole. "Scott's dying appeal shall not fall on deaf ears," said Asquith in lauding the dead explorer, and wound up by a peroration which left not a dry eye in the historic chamber.

KELLY VERSUS JUDGE STILES

State Health Officer Dr. Eugene R. Kelly of Seattle had a lively tilt with Judge Stiles at the city hall today over Kelly's bill to give the state health board absolute jurisdiction over all water and sewer questions in the state. Stiles has been opposing the bill, which was introduced by Peder Jensen in the senate. "You've killed my bill," Kelly told him, and he made it plain to the city attorney that he was not pleased about it. Stiles insisted that if the rest of the state wanted that kind of a bill he had no objections, but he did not want any guardian appointed for Tacoma.

PORTIRIO DIAZ

(By United Press Leased Wire.) MEXICO CITY, Feb. 11.—Cable notice from Cairo, Egypt, to General Diaz that he is willing to devote his remaining days to the land he "loves better than life," is reported to have been received from Mexico's "Iron man." Felix Diaz is quoted as saying he does not demand the presidency for himself.

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 11.—The Madero administration was dealt another body blow here today when General Angeles, on whom President Madero had depended for support, led his command to the arsenal, where Felix Diaz, the invading insurgent general, is fortified, and joined the revolutionists. Madero, it developed today, has but 1,500 troops still loyal to his cause, while it is estimated that Diaz' rebel force exceeds 3,000 men. Both Diaz and Madero are confident of success, but the rebel commander is admitted to have every advantage. "The revolt is progressing," said Diaz early today, "and within a few hours will have been settled. All chances favor us. You can give assurance that my future policy will be to protect American property and citizens in Mexico City, as I did when I controlled the seaport of Vera Cruz." The movements of General Angeles have been mysterious since the outbreak of the Diaz revolt. First reports, issued by a Madero official, announced that he was
