HARRY THAW MAKES NEW MOVE

(By United Press Leased Wire.)
NEW YORK, March 6.—Permission to withdraw his suit for a trial by a jury to determine his sanity was granted Harry K. Thaw, slayer of Stanford White, here today by Justice Giegerich of the state supreme court and the Pittsburgher was immediately returned to the Matteawan for the criminal insane.
This decision was reached by Thaw when he learned that the state proposed to use the proceedings before Justice Giegerich as a lever to disclose the so-called bribery scandal at Matteawan in which Dr. John W. Russell, former superintendent of the institution, alleged he had been offered \$25,000 by John Anhut, a New York attorney, to aid Thaw in his efforts for freedom.
When the case was called today Attorney Henry S. Irbrecht of Newberg, N. Y., representing Thaw, demanded permission to withdraw the suit.

WALLA WALLA HAS BIG BLAZE

WALLA WALLA, March 6.—Fire originating in the first floor of the Hanger & Thompson department store early today completely wrecked the four story structure and caused a loss of \$150,000. Mrs. W. C. Hanger and Mrs. C. J. Munroe, occupants of a rooming house on the upper floor, were rescued by being lowered with ropes by their husbands and other men, who then slid to safety.

UNDAUNTED BY BLIZZARD MUSHERS STRIKE GOLD RUNS \$6.00 TO THE PAN

DARROW STILL TALKING TO THE JURY

LOS ANGELES, March 6.—Fighting for his own good name, Clarence Darrow today resumed his closing address to the jury that will decide his fate on a charge of bribing Robert F. Bain, a juror in the McNamara trial. It was said Earl Rogers, chief defense counsel, probably will not address the jury, thus giving to Darrow all the time that remains for the defense. Assistant District Attorney Ford will close for the prosecution. According to a schedule tentatively outlined today, Ford should complete his address about 8 o'clock tonight if a plan to continue the afternoon session until all arguments are finished is adopted. In this event the case will be given to the jury tonight.

BABY SLEPT; CASE WAS DISMISSED

Samuel C. Asia insisted he was not exceeding the speed limit and cited as proof that a baby in the bottom of the machine slept soundly through it all. That was a new argument for Judge Magill.
