

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

# THOUSANDS CELEBRATE EASTER SPECIAL MUSIC IN CHURCHES CITY SEES GLORIOUS SUNDAY

Peans of praise and portrayals of primping mingled throughout the city wherever a church existed. Special music was given by most church choirs and special groups of musicians. Special sermons were heard from all the pulpits. The cantata, "The Nazarene," was sung and a portrait of Livingston, the African explorer, unveiled at First Christian church. Dr. Sutton of Oklahoma preached morning and evening at First Baptist. An Easter rally of the Sunday school and Easter program by the Bible class were features at Lincoln Park Christian. "The Life of Christ in Song and Verse" formed the theme of a program at Sixth avenue Baptist. Ivanhoe Knights Templar attended the First Presbyterian morning service. Dr. James Francis Ross of Los Angeles began a three weeks service at the First United Presbyterian. A double quartet assisted at the service at Immanuel Presbyterian. Eight anthems adapted from "Tor, a Street Boy of Jerusalem," were sung at Manitor Presbyterian. Bishop Keator conducted the service at St. John's Episcopal, special music being a feature. # STORM COMES UNHERALDED

(By United Press Leased Wire.) OMAHA, Neb., March 24.—The storm was first observed just before 6 o'clock, coming from the southwest with the speed of an express train. Its roar could be heard long before it struck. Ahead of the storm was a huge, fan-shaped cloud. It grew darker and gradually narrowed to a funnel shape, dipping earthward, and wherever it struck, it killed, maimed and razed. People in every section of the city watched the approach of the cyclone. The streets through which it passed are piled high with debris today. Uninjured people rushed to the aid of the injured. Every available automobile and wagon was pressed into service and the injured rushed to hospitals. All physicians and nurses in Omaha quickly volunteered their services and hurried to the various hospitals to attend to the dying and injured. Undertakers Busy. Every undertaking establishment here and in South Omaha is taxed to the limit in caring for the dead. At daylight the city commissioners and Mayor Dahlmann assumed charge of the relief work. Headquarters were established in a branch telephone exchange on the north side, and Major Hartman's office to take charge of the polling of the devastated district, aided by from 200 to 300 regular soldiers, was accepted. Every policeman and fireman in Omaha, South Omaha and Council Bluffs are at work to prevent looting.

# REGULATOR OF CHICAGO'S MORALS

(By United Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, March 24.—Major M. L. C. Funkhauser, newly created second superintendent of police, went on the job this morning as "regulator of public morals," and official checker of the Chicago police department. The eyes of the city officials all over the country, who are interested in the police administration are upon him. Funkhauser's position is a new one. It is an experiment attempted by the city council in an effort to get many of the criticisms directed at police department of large cities. And even the new deputy doesn't know exactly what he is going to do. As head of the investigation department Funkhauser will receive all complaints that policemen have failed to do their duty. While the regular patrolmen are on their beats, the second superintendent will have a force of men conducting investigations under his personal supervision. They will investigate reports of gambling, reports of prevalence of vice in certain districts and reports of all kinds of crime. The Funkhauser squad will make no arrests. The reports of their work will be turned over to Chief McWeeney and will constitute an official check on the operations of the patrolmen and plain clothes men. It will be up to McWeeney to act.

# MENACE TO AMERICAN WOMANHOOD MUST BE REMOVED--GOV. O'HARA

By BARRATT O'HARA, Chairman of Vice Commission Now Conducting Remarkable Investigation in Chicago Into the Relation Between Low Wages and White Slavery—O'Hara is Lieutenant Governor of Illinois. Our committee confess that they sacrificed their virtue in order to live! Their wages were not sufficient to keep off starvation. When such a shameful fact confronts us, there seems one effective and imperative solution. Now I do not wish to be considered as one who commends a woman who will give up her virtue in preference to her life, if the crisis arises. But I am humiliated to know that because of grinding wages the crisis is ever allowed to loom in all its ugliness before any American girl! And if these wages are paid by millionaire "philanthropists," so much more ugly is the blot on our pride. From every angle of the evidence thus far presented to Senators Jaul, Beall, Tossey, Woodard and myself, it appears conclusively that wages have much to do with white slavery. A minimum wage law, then, would seem to be the only natural remedy. Finding this to be the case, I have communicated with the governor of each and every state of the Union, suggesting a commission similar to that now at work in Illinois. From many of these I have already heard. I have little doubt that we shall have prompt and definite action throughout the country resulting in legislation establishing a pretty uniform minimum wage scale. I have also written President Wilson, asking his support of a national minimum wage law. With the overwhelming popular sentiment existing in favor of a minimum wage law, I feel no doubt as to the prompt saving of thousands of girls through the abolition of starvation wages. The menace to American womanhood must be removed now and forever, or America will go the way of Rome. It is our patriotic duty to stand by this until the problem is solved!

# DEATH PENALTY ABOLISHED IN THIS STATE

The death penalty is wiped out in the state of Washington. Governor Lister attached his name to the Goss bill Saturday and it becomes the law of the state. This bill repeals the old law providing capital punishment for murder in the first degree and makes the penalty life imprisonment. A companion bill introduced by Goss to limit the pardoning power of the governor failed to get through so the governor will have full power to do as he wishes in the future. The Times and other representatives of modern ideas made a vigorous campaign for the enactment of this law and after three attempts the measure was finally put through the legislature.

# HYDE JUROR FOUND DEAD

# CRITICIZED, HE IS NOW DECEASED

(By United Press Leased Wire.) OAKLAND, March 24.—Shot down by G. Tomnago, a fellow countryman, because he had criticized the relations between the Japanese in California and California merchants in a public lecture here, S. Yoshida, prominent in the Japanese-American association in California, is near death here today. The gunman was captured after an exciting chase and is under arrest. The Anti-Tuberculosis society of the state is keeping on the trail of Governor Lister who will take up the \$50,000 appropriation bill for the work in this state today. Dr. Christian Quevill, president of the state society, says that 1,240 die with the disease in this state every year.
