


22 BODIES IN MORGUE

(By United Press Leased Wire.) DAYTON, O., March 29.—At 2 o'clock this afternoon 22 bodies lay in the general morgue here. Identification of the corpses is proceeding slowly.

Water is being pumped out of the basement of the Algonquin hotel this afternoon to repair whatever damage may have been done to the Algonquin's artesian well so as to get a supply of water for protection in case of fire. Another artesian plant will be in operation before night.

Sued for \$50,000

On Eve of Wedding SAN FRANCISCO, March 29.—Served with a ribbon-bound summons to appear as a defendant in five damage suits aggregating \$50,000 a few moments before his wedding to Miss Edith Sellers here, W. L. Hyman, a local shoe manufacturer, ordered the wedding to proceed. Then he lost no time in starting on his honeymoon trip.

The suits were brought by striking boot and shoe makers who Hyman is alleged to have had arrested for picketing before his place of business. False imprisonment is the charge.

DOCTOR FOUND GUILTY OF FRAUD

(By United Press Leased Wire.) SAN FRANCISCO, March 29.—Pathos and hysteria marked the sentencing of Dr. L. Lampert of Sacramento and Frank Glando of San Francisco by Judge Van Fleet in the U. S. district court here today. Lampert was tried and found guilty of misusing the mails and Glando pleaded guilty to a similar charge.

Lampert was sentenced to pay a fine of \$250 and to six months confinement in the county jail at Sacramento. Glando was sentenced to pay a fine of \$500.

Keyes, his body shaking with sobs, was found today still holding the corpse in his arms.

Balloon Traveled a Long Time

(By United Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., March 9.—W. H. Haskins has a toy balloon today which, according to a note attached, was set afloat at San Diego, Cal., July 7, 1912. Haskins found the balloon on the outskirts of the city. The note was signed by Paul Schint, who wrote that he had released the miniature gas bag to see how far it would travel. If the balloon was really released at San Diego, it covered a distance of more than 1,650 miles.
