### NEW RATE CARD WILL BE READY WEDNESDAY

The city council will tomorrow be given the new rate card for the sale of light and power by the special committee which has been working on it for two weeks.  
 The committee will check up their figures today and the final report is expected by the council at the regular session Wednesday. A big cut is anticipated in the rates for domestic use. No change is contemplated in the present lighting rates but a plan will be evolved whereby a joint lighting and cooking rate will be made that will reduce the cost of both to a point that will make it possible for every housewife to cook cheaper with electricity than with gas, coal or wood.  
 The council will also pass legislation tomorrow for the complete equipment of the city sub-station so it will be able to deliver 32,000 horsepower to consumers here.

The warrant for their arrest has been placed in the hands of Sheriff Cudihoe. Humphries declares that this is no April fool joke, as he is determined to force the commission to supply American flags for the superior court room which he occupies.

### The Story of World's Greatest Financier

**J. P. Morgan was born at Hartford, Conn., April 17, 1837. He was a banker for 56 years and for the past 20 years undisputed and absolute king of American finance. He was dominant, his friends said, because of his ruthless aggressiveness, dauntless strength, undeniable exaction and power quickly to fuse divided elements.**  
 During the tumultuous times of the panic of 1907, Morgan dragged the great fortunes of the world through the marts of finance, powerless at his chariot wheels. And for days he was virtual dictator of the finances of the civilized world.  
**Born Rich.**  
 Unlike many modern financiers, Morgan was not born a poor man. His millions were not accumulated with that absorbing attention to detail that marked the growth of the Rockefeller millions. His father, Junius Spencer Morgan, was a wealthy New England banker and the father mapped out a great financial future for his son.  
 As a boy Morgan attended high school in Boston and later studied for three years at the University of Göttingen, Germany. His active business career began in 1859, when he became a clerk in the banking house of Duncan, Sherman & Co., one of his father's banks. A short time later he organized a banking house of his own, known as Dabney, Morgan & Co. This concern later became known as J. Pierpont Morgan & Co., the most powerful banking house in America.  
 Morgan's railroad operations began in 1870. In that year he organized the Erie railroad and was at once recognized as an active figure in the railroad world. From then on he obtained control of railroad systems throughout the country and welded them into one great chain—the Morgan lines.  
**Rapid Strides.**  
 Morgan came into his own, however, between the panics of 1893 and 1907. Following the harrowing days of 1893 he stepped out with a following of wealth never before equalled in the history of the world and took his place at the head of the hosts that were scrambling for the meager remains of great financial institutions, and the wonderful opportunities that dawning prosperity offered.  
 In the 14 years between the panics, Morgan and his allies made more financial history than had been furnished by all the financiers of the half century preceding. During this period, Morgan was at his best and he absorbed industry after industry. Battle after battle was fought within the narrow confines of Wall street, but Morgan always came out victorious.

**Morgan "Comes Back."**  
 The year of 1907 was a year of financial terror. Morgan was looked upon as an old and broken man by his enemies. But Morgan was still on the scene of battle. He swept into Wall street and at the end of two weeks of the greatest financial struggle the world had ever seen, even John D. Rockefeller came from his quiet home to lay his millions at the feet of the conquering financier. This was Morgan's greatest triumph and the one which pleased him most. He took advantage of the rout, too. To repay himself for his exertions he gathered into his pet merger—the United States Steel company—the Tennessee Coal & Iron company, chief rival of the steel trust.  
**Routed Carnegie.**  
 Morgan ousted Andrew Carnegie from his wonderful control of the steel industry when he threw a billion dollars' worth of stock into Wall street labelled "United States Steel, common," backed by not a single dollar of real assets. From one end of the earth to the other, Morgan distributed that billion dollars worth of apparently worthless securities, until every dollar of it was absorbed. Then came the crash. United States Steel collapsed and thousands of persons were ruined. But Morgan stayed. For years he fought on for United States Steel until he put it on a dividend paying basis, an achievement which he considered one of the most satisfying of his career.  
**Morgan's Appearance.**  
 As a man Morgan was the same physical freebooter that swept all before in the marts of finance. Huge, rough and bear-like in appearance, his manner was gruff, explosive and at times overbearing. Piercing black eyes, peering from beneath a pair of dark beetling brows, and a huge head covered with shaggy iron gray hair made him the modern embodiment of a medieval border rider. A nose that would have graced a Cyranus de Bergerac, huge, bulbous, aug-
