BUSINESS MEN HEAR TOWSON

The anticoupon bill becomes a law June 20th, 1913. Three months of preparation to kick it back into the dark ages whence it came. For your edification we print the principal clause of this beautiful thing:

Section 1. Every person, firm or corporation who shall use, and every person, firm or corporation who shall furnish to any other person, firm or corporation to use, in, with, or for the sale of any goods, wares or merchandise, any stamps, coupons, tickets, certificates, cards, or other similar devices which shall entitle the purchaser receiving the same with such sale of goods, wares or merchandise to procure by any person, firm or corporation any goods, wares or merchandise free of charge or for less than the retail market price thereof, upon the production of any number of stamps, coupons, tickets, certificates, cards, or other similar devices, shall before so furnishing, selling, or using the same obtain a separate license from the auditor of each county wherein such furnishing or selling or using shall take place for each and every store or place of business in that county, owned or conducted by such person, firm or corporation from which such furnishing or selling, or in which such using, shall take place.

Think of it! \$6000 a year for the right of giving you what belongs to you. Who is behind this nefarious act? High Price Combines! Have they ever done anything for the public good? Can they point to one act, committed or intentionally omitted that reduced the cost of living to a soul in this state? Their object in life is to keep up the prices to increase the cost of living, not to help you, the people. Not so with the gang pushing the bill. They represented associations, organizations, special interests, interests inimicable if you please, to that of the people. In all they represented a thousand voters, while the unorganized army against the bill was nearer 60,000. The 1000 had the power. Their representatives had full fling of the legislative floors and the committee rooms. They came and went as they pleased. They admitted that they had both houses in their inside pockets. This in the state of Washington, in this year of liberty 1913! Is it any wonder that the cry has gone forth "abolish the legislature"? If this is democracy deliver me from it!
