LUKE LEA IS A COMER

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 1.—This is the story of the boy comer, too—but still just a smooth-faced, eager-eyed boy with noble ideals, who put aside his duties to a sick wife and two beautiful little sons,—who waited anxiously for him in a far away city—while he fought for a month, single-handed, the power of the whole United States sen-



ate. You have probably read how the progressive democrats won a great victory in the senate by curbing the old gang of reactionary democrats.

If so, you've got a guess coming. They have done no such thing. They have sold out to the old gang, lock, stock and barrel.

The boy did everything within the range of human possibility to stop them. He tore his mind from his frail young wife, who was anxiously watching for his cheering smile, while she struggled for health in Denver. He forced himself to put his boys out of his thoughts. He staid on the job in Washington, fighting for political decency, and he was knocked down, trampled on and crushed out of political existence.

The young fighter is Luke Lea, the boy-senator from Tennessee, not yet 34 years old. When it became apparent that the democrats would control the new senate, Lea proposed to the older progressives that they oust the old crowd of democratic Tories who had been helping Aldrich fool the people. They told him it couldn't be done, but the word "can't" is not found in young

Lea's six-foot-three frame of 200 pounds. He organized the fight on Senator Thomas S. Martin of Virginia, the close friend of Thomas Fortune Ryan, the Virginia multi-millionaire, beat Martin and elected Senator John Kern of Indiana as democratic leader.

The drubbing was complete. The progressives elected a "steering" committee to select the senate's committees, putting seven of their own number and two of the old fellows on it.

That was some traveling for the youngest man ever elected to the senate, and Lea felt that his neglect of his family for duty had been justified. The fight was

won. In a few days he could hurry to Denver, help his wife get well and have some good romps with Luke junior, aged 6, and Percy, aged 4.

Now comes the tragic joke. And the steering committee gave the biggest chairmanships to the very men who had just been ousted from control.

That was where Luke Lea fought his hardest, and that was where he was wiped off the sen-



ate map. For two days he demanded that chairmanships go to progressives. One by one the committee quit him—yielding to the old "seniority rule," fearful of the age and dignity of the old-timers. At the last Lea was the only senator who stood out. He went down with guns belching, but he went clear down and was stamped into the ground.

Martin, who had been beaten for senate leader, was made chairman of the powerful committee on appropriations. Simmons of North Carolina, who helped Aldrich become the public in 1909 with the Payne tariff bill, was made chairman of the committee on finance, which will handle the democratic tariff bill in the senate this spring.

Yet the only voice raised against putting them in charge of the new democratic senate was that of a boy from Tennessee.

Luke Lea has quit Washington to join his family in Denver. There is now no reason why his boys should not enjoy two or three weeks of fun with their dad—and Lea is so constructed that they will. Young Mrs. Lea and her sons will never know from his face or manner that while his heart was torn for them his colleagues crucified him on a cross of fear. Lea isn't built that way.

MISS WIMPLE TO PULLMAN

The city will pay Miss A. B. Wimple's expenses to send her to Pullman to make a speech at the meeting of professional women to be called there this month. The council demurred this morning but the mayor insisted he would keep her down to \$25.

"If you are going to send her, send her right," said Freeland.






