WASHINGTON, D. C., April 30.—The president will make no statement concerning the alien bill adopted by the California senate until he receives a detailed report from Bryan. BOSTON, April 30.—Because of present duties, Dr. Charles W. Elliott, former president of Harvard university, declined to head the white slave commission after being requested to do so by Governor Foss. Elliott expressed sympathy with the movement to abate the white slave traffic.

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 30.—The commerce commission today announced the appointment of engineers who are to have charge of the work placing a physical valuation on the railroads of the country. The board consists of R. A. Thompson, employe of the California railroad commission; W. D. Pence, chief engineer of the Wisconsin railroad commission; J. H. Worley of Kansas City; Howard Jones, Nashville; E. F. Wendt, Pittsburgh, and an army engineer to be added later.


FIVE WHOPPERS COMING HERE THIS WEEK

ST. LOUIS, April 30.—Lakes to Gulf navigation was resumed here today when the steamer E. C. Conway entered the Illinois river carrying the first consignment of merchandise billed by the directors of the Chicago Association of Commerce, from Chicago to New Orleans.

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EARTHQUAKE REGISTERED AT CAPITAL

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 30.—An earthquake beginning at 6:51 and ending at 8 o'clock today, apparently occurring at a great distance from here, was registered on the seismograph at Georgetown university.

BURGLARS ROB THREE STORES

Burglars early this morning broke into and robbed two stores on Pacific avenue by climbing over the transoms in the main entrance. Another store on Jefferson avenue was broken into in a similar manner. Michael Brothers' drug store, at 1326 Pacific avenue, was robbed of goods valued at \$40 while the Mecca saloon at 1306 Pacific avenue was robbed of a small amount of money. The Cow Butcher store at 1506 1/2 Jefferson avenue was robbed of \$7. No attempt was made to crack the safes in any of the places. All the burglaries took place after midnight.

PEACE CONGRESS OPEN TOMORROW

ST. PAUL, April 30.—Peace exercises were held today in every high school, college and university throughout Missouri in honor of the Fourth American Peace congress, which formally opens tomorrow. Today, the preliminary program of the congress closed with a meeting for public school teachers at the Soldan high school. Hundreds of delegates to the congress previously visited the high schools and colleges of St. Louis to take part in and lead the peace exercises.

LEISHMANN ACT MUCH DISCUSSED

WASHINGTON, D. C., April 30.—Foreign and domestic diplomatic society is greatly interested in the romance of Nancy Leishman and the duke of Croÿ, particularly in the feature that Ambassador Leishman, contrary to all precedents, is flouting and still disregards so far as known here, the objections to the marriage interposed by the kaiser and the emperor of Austria.

APPLETON JOINS WISC. LEAGUE

MILWAUKEE, April 30.—The Milwaukee baseball fans were given another team to cheer today when the Wisconsin-Illinois league opened its season of 126 games. The locals lined up here against Appletoox. Other games were Green Bay and Racine, Wausau and Rockford, Ill., and Oshkosh and Madison.

MEN RESCUED FROM CRAFT IN FLAMES

PORT TOWNSEND, April 30.—The United States power lifesaving boat Audacious is a wreck on Marrowstone point, off Fort Flagler, as a result of an explosion and fire. The Audacious, in command of Capt. G. W. McAfee, was on her way from Seattle to Waddah Island station at Neah bay, and when near Fort Flagler, at 9 o'clock last night, an explosion of gas occurred and in a few seconds the craft was ablaze. A launch reached the Audacious just as Capt. McAfee and the man accompanying him were in the act of jumping overboard. They were taken aboard the launch and a line was made fast to the Audacious and she was beached, her stern being burned off.

SUSPEND WORK

KANSAS CITY, Mo., April 30.—Ten fire insurance companies doing business in Missouri today, through their local agents, suspended writing new insurance on account of the repeal of the Oliver rating law by the last legislature. Seven other companies previously withdrawn from the state.
