COUPLE FREED OF MURDER SUSPICION

Dolly Carroll, former wife of Dr. James Carroll of Tacoma, and Al Young, arrested by United States officers here in Winslow Wednesday for using the mails to defraud, were saved from serious complications with the murder of Carl Axel Westman, of Winslow, by the presence of Burns detectives, who accounted for their movements on the night of April 26, when Westman was shot.

When Sheriff Shattuck heard of the arrest of Mrs. Carroll and Young he came to Seattle to learn if they were in any way connected with the murder of the watchman. The Burns detective agency furnished alibi for the couple.

On the night that Westman was murdered Young and Mrs. Carroll were in their room from 9 o'clock on. The three detectives were in the next room with a dictograph and recorded all their conversation.

LONE BANDIT ROBS TRAIN

KANSAS CITY, May 2.—Jesse E. Short, a Joplin, Missouri, millionaire miner, is dying and a posse of officers is following the bloody trail of a bandit who yesterday morning held up the Kansas City and Southern passenger train here and succeeded in getting \$1,500 in cash and much jewelry.

The robber is probably seriously wounded.

After Short had given up \$1,000 in cash and diamonds and his watch, the bandit passed on. Short pulled his automatic revolver from under his pillow and blazed away through the curtain and emptied his gun through the curtain, shooting Short through the head and shoulder.

The thief then ran and jumped off the train. He left a trail of blood after him.

"For each bottle, five days," said the court.


FOOD INSPECTOR WARNS DEALERS
