There aren't any more "Willie" Hestons at Michigan university, but, instead, the school where Branch Rickey coaches the ball players boast of a diamond star who looks like a combination left-handed Ed Walsh and Ty Cobb in embryo. He is George Sisler.

When Sisler is not pitching he plays the outfield and bats fourth, being the best clean-up man Michigan has had in decades. Joe Sugden, Detroit scout, says

of him: "He has the best curve of any left-hander I ever looked at."

Rickey plays a better game than many a class A leaguer right now.

Sisler is also fast. He has been "clocked" going to first in 3-5 seconds. He starts Michigan's opponents by going from first to third or from second home on an infield out or a fly to the outfield.

Few college players know how

to run bases and not many slide properly. Sisler is an aggressive runner and has the hook slide down to perfection.

His one fault seems to be over-anxiety to hit. If he has other weaknesses they remain hidden. In the south Rickey was in a hurry to catch a train one day and, calling Sisler in from the outfield, told him to finish the game in a hurry. This he did by pitching nine balls, striking out the last three batters, who only heard the balls whizz past.
