

BOY SCOUTS PREPARE FOR THEIR CAMP

The Boy Scouts of America are preparing for camp. It is likely that there will be more camping parties throughout the country this summer than ever before. To Irrigate 10-Acre Ranch He Pulls the Plug of Big Bath Tub

WASCO, Cal., May 6.—Here's how one man makes a 10-acre farm pay. Ed Weit believes in irrigation and puts water on the alfalfa and trees on his 10-acre farm. This is all right as far as it goes, but Ed does better than that. He makes the water work before it goes onto the ground. It is utilized in a public bath house which he conducts as a side issue to the farm. And a profitable side issue it is.

Under the improved method of irrigation adopted in this section of California, water is stored in reservoirs to conserve it and make it possible to be put on to the crops with sufficient "head" to secure the maximum efficiency. For a small tract an earthen reservoir is thrown upon the highest point available on the place. This is filled by an electrically operated pump that runs continually, and the power companies giving a very

much lower rate for such service than for intermittent service. In this way a small pump is ample to fill the reservoir over night, and during the day it is emptied at the rancher's leisure. Well, Ed Weit saw some possibilities in this, because his reservoir was full practically all of the time. He improved it by lining it with reinforced concrete and made a plunge 150 by 20 feet.

So Ed built a roof or pavilion over his reservoir and opened a swimming pool.

Oh, fine! How the neighborhood does flock to that swimming pool in the torrid summer time. At the most nominal fee his water now costs him less than nothing a month. And when the boys and girls have disported to their hearts' content, Ed pulls the plug of their huge tub, as it were, and irrigates his patch of alfalfa and his truck garden.




