

FEAR OFFICER TAKEN AWAY BY SMUGGLERS

SEATTLE, May 10.—The sudden disappearance of Neil MacArthur, government customs inspector, has caused a sensation in the customs office and a searching investigation will be made by the Washington authorities to see whether there has been any connivance between the customs officials and opium smugglers. It is said MacArthur often called at the home of Charlie Louie, the Chinese opium smuggler, and that Louie was present when MacArthur shot Emil Sorenson, and in fact the shooting was done with Louie's pistol. MacArthur will probably be arrested if he is found.

STREETS RUINED

The street railway company is ruining the newly paved streets by the hauling of heavy freight over them. All along the new South Tacoma pavement for blocks the concrete under the tracks has been crushed and the tracks have sunk by reason of heavy loads of logs and wood hauled. Commissioner Woods says he will have an ordinance prepared to limit the loads the company may haul.
