City in Revolt at the High Cost of Living Puts a Crimp in the Middleman by Establishing Own Free Markets

LOS ANGELES, Cal., May 14.—"Lower cost of living" has just received a boost here by the opening of municipal curb markets, at which the housewife can buy vegetables, eggs, chickens, rabbits and other things to eat without paying any profit to the middleman.

For a long time Los Angeles has been better than a gold mine for the middleman. He has handled all the produce brought to the city by the ranchers and gardeners. He has paid the producer any price he wanted to, and has sold at a big profit. He has seen to it that the market was never over supplied, destroying produce and vegetables rather than allow the price to go below what he thought it ought to be. Neither the producer nor the consumer were satisfied with this condition of affairs, and the matter was widely discussed. Finally the city decided to take a hand, and it established three curb markets, where producers could bring their stuff on certain days each week and sell directly to the consumers. The middleman fought hard against the plan, and tried his best to tie up all the producers on contracts. In this he was

partially successful, for the producer was rather fearful that the housewives would not go to the markets to buy directly from him. However, when the municipal markets were opened, recently, every producer who was there sold out just as fast as he could wait on customers and in less than an hour after the markets were opened everyone of them was sold out and the people were clamoring for more produce.

What is more, every producer got better prices for his stuff than he had been getting from the middleman, and every consumer bought for less than he would have paid the regular dealer. More producers started for the market than got there, for the crafty middleman sent emissaries out to intercept producers bringing loads to the municipal market and try to persuade them not to go there, even going so far as to buy up the produce in some instances, but now the city has put an end to that, and every market day sees more producers on hand to sell to the consumers. The city plans to establish more of these markets and enlarge on the plan until every part of the city has its own market.

Salad Dressing Lemon Pie.

Dear Miss Grey: Will you please publish a good dressing for potato salad, and also lemon pie recipe? Thank you. YOUNG WIFE.

A.—Cream Dressing—One teaspoon mustard, 1 teaspoon salt, 2 teaspoons flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons powdered sugar, few grains cayenne, 1 teaspoon melted butter, yolk one egg, 1-3 cup hot vinegar, 1/2 cup thick cream. Mix dry ingredients, add butter, egg and vinegar slowly. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly, until mixture thickens, cool, and add to heavy cream, beaten until stiff. Lemon Pie—3 eggs, 2-3 cup sugar, 1/4 cup lemon juice, grated rind 1/2 lemon, 2 tablespoons water. Beat eggs slightly, add sugar, lemon juice, grated rind, and water. Bake in one crust in a moderate oven. Cool slightly, cover with meringue made from whites of eggs, powdered sugar and lemon juice and return to oven to brown.
