AL CRANE MAKES RECORD HIGH JUMP

The phenomenal jumping of Al Crane featured Saturday's track meet between Broadway and Stadium High schools, which was won by the latter, 67 to 46. Crane astounded all spectators by clearing the bar in the high jump at six feet one and three-quarters inches. It surpasses all records on the coast, except that held by Horine, the wonderful jumper of Stanford last year. Coach Bell will send Crane to Chicago June 20 as the Stadium High representative in the contests between all schools in the United States.

With his title of featherweight champion, Johnny Kilbane is showing some of the habits of the former title holder, Abe Attell.
