LAUNDRY GIRLS CLEAR \$500 AT DANCE; UNIONS COMING TO SUPPORT

The striking laundry girls cleared \$500 by their dance Saturday night and money is coming for them from various unions to support them in their fight for better conditions. The bosses have hired private detectives to shadow President James Brock, according to the latter, to try to get something on him by which they can run him out of town and thus break up the strike. Brock says two detectives got a room next to him in the Warburton apartments and pored a hole through the wall, hoping to get some evidence that would involve him in something they could use. He says he believes he was to have been held up Saturday night. He was asked whether he expected to take the money home from the dance. "I think they expected to hold me up and get the money and then they would make the girls believe I had gotten away with it and this would have been used to discredit me and break up the movement," said Brock.


