INSURANCE IS COSTING THIS CITY \$1,000

The state industrial insurance is costing the city of Tacoma about \$1,000 a month. In the 19 months since the law went into effect the city has paid to the state for protection of city employees \$19,181.41. Of this the public works department paid \$1,860.50; gravity water works, \$5,424.95; Nisqually power, \$1,902; regular water department, \$2,964.41; regular light department, \$6,750.65; dock, \$278.65.

FALCONER HERE ON A VISIT

Congressman A. J. Falconer of Everett, one of the progressive members of the lower house of Washington, is back home. He was in Tacoma this morning and is enthusiastic over the prospects of the people coming into their own in the near future.

Falconer is recognized as one of the big men in this state and it is not unlikely that he may be selected by the progressives of the state to contest with Senator Wesley Jones for the senatorial toga in 1914.

Congressman Falconer came back to Washington to get his family and after taking them to the old homestead at Saugetack, Mich., he will return to his duties at Washington.

"The people everywhere feel very friendly toward President Wilson," said Falconer.

Morgan Art Is To Escape Tax

ALBANY, N. Y., May 27.—The valuable collection of works of art, pictures, books and antiques of the late J. Pierpont Morgan will be exempt from the state inheritance tax provided the collection is turned over "to a municipal corporation of the state for educational purposes by the heirs within two years."
