The girls are arranging a big ball to be held at Dreamland ring Saturday, June 21, the proceeds of which will be used to buy machinery with which to equip a co-operative laundry which they intend to start.

LIGHT DEPARTMENT TO START EQUIPING PLANT TO HANDLE BUSINESS

Bids are being called for the purchase by the light department of the city of about \$30,000 worth of transformers to complete the equipment of the city substation. When these are installed the city will be in a position to deliver to consumers here over 32,000 horsepower of current 24 hours a day.

This will be more than enough to supply the whole city and run the street railway system in the bargain.
