GREATEST YOUNG PITCHER BASEBALL HAS EVER KNOWN---"TEX" RUSSELL

Having shown what he could do with the American league batsman in every city on the Ban Johnson circuit, "Tex" Russell, also known as "Rebel" Russell, the heavyweight left-hander of the White Sox, is due to receive recognition as the greatest young pitcher that ever broke into the national game.

Russell has been pitching wonderful ball ever since the season
