PREDICTED THAT PRESIDENT WILL CAUSE REMOVAL

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 26.—Summary removal by President Wilson is the fate predicted for Ambassador Wilson, who today held a long interview with Bryan on his actions in Mexico since the overthrow and assassination of President Madero.

Wilson will be allowed to lay the groundwork of the case against himself. He conferred with Secretary Bryan for 40 minutes, and was instructed to write a full report of his actions since the fall of Madero.

PLANT BLOWN UP, WORKERS TRAPPED

MALDEN, Mass., July 26.—(United Press.)—Twenty-one employees of the New England Dyeing & Cleaning Company are missing, following a terrific explosion of two hundred gallons of naphtha, which was heard for miles around. Immediately following the noise a great sheet of blazing oil shot into the air, setting eight other structures on fire.

All available fire apparatus has been rushed to the scene, though the burning oil scattered for blocks around make the work of rescue hazardous. Thick clouds of smoke from the dyeing plant also made the search for the missing dangerous. Hundreds of windows were smashed by the concussion.

WIDOW CAN NOT GET THE PENSION

As announced by the Times several days ago, the widow of B. N. Bradford, the retired police officer who died recently, will not receive the pension he drew while living. The law, according to the opinion of the city attorney, filed with the city clerk, makes no provision for heirs of retired officers.

WATER BILL BEATS RENT

PRETTY WOMAN MURDERED IN PARK

CHICAGO, July 26.—The body of an unidentified woman, neatly dressed, with a bullet wound in her forehead, was found this morning on the shore of a tiny lake in Rogers park, with a revolver nearby. She was about 30 years old and exceptionally pretty. There were no powder marks on the face or body, indicating that she had not fired the fatal shot herself. A score of detectives, working on the case, have come to the conclusion that the woman was lured to the spot in an automobile and murdered. Every clue is being run down eagerly.
