The bunch at the park had already prepared to make excuses for a late supper when Girot spat on the ball, took a look at third, and with his back turned secondbaseward at an angle of about 60 degrees he put the speed on the ball. He didn't see Coltrin tearing home and when the sphere struck the catcher's mitt with a thud a cloud of dust that looked like a Kansas cyclone in the making rose from the home plate. It was little Coltrin with the winning run.


Men Whom Baseball Has Made Rich. Connie Mack is Quite Rich

The best loved man in baseball; that's Connie Mack, winner of four American league and two world's pennants, manager and part owner of the Athletics, who 29 years ago quit shoe making at Haverhill, Mass. to play ball. Connie Mack is worth perhaps a quarter of a million, and he made it out of baseball, saving and investing his money. Mack went into baseball because he loved the game. He is a success through his ability to judge and handle men, because of his far-sightedness and unerring judgment, backed by hard work. He required no pull. He had ability. Mack was 22 when he quit making shoes. His first baseball job was as catcher with a Connecticut club which sold him to Washington. He went next to Pittsburgh. For nine years Mack played in the National and he was in the Brotherhood for a year. Mack bought his release from Pittsburgh, counting his 10 years a failure and decided to begin over. He signed to manage Milwaukee, where he was given full authority. In Milwaukee he started his correspondence school which has landed him most of the men who have won flags for the Athletics. The majority of Mack's correspondents were ex-players whose friend he always was and who are well paid for the discovery of a player whom Mack signs. When the American league was organized Mack was appointed manager of the Athletics and he backed his judgment by investing \$18,000 in club stock. Today he owns one-quarter of the club, which has a half million dollar home and spends \$90,000 annually in running expenses.

The word of Connie Mack, leader of the Athletics, has been given that the wonderful infield of his pennant-winning team, which is valued at \$100,000 by baseball men, did not cost him a nickel.

Such financial genius should awaken for Mack the profound admiration of John D. Rockefeller or Andy Carnegie, our best known investors.

In Frank Baker, at third base; Jack Barry at shortstop; Eddie Collins at second base and "Stuffy" McInnis at first base, the Athletics have the greatest infield combination now in baseball and probably the best that ever played the game.

Although valued at \$100,000 this sum would not buy them. They are worth more than that to the owners of the Athletics, for they win pennants and world's

championships and produce dividends, the size of which only the men of the American league know.

Unless something breaks before the last days of September, these boys will be disputing with some National league club for the title of world's champions, for the third time in four years. Twice they have won the honor. Last year, inflated by success in 1911 and '12, the team dissipated and loafed until Boston won the honor, but this summer, after a winter spent in Cuba, they have performed like the Athletics of old and appear to be unbeatable.

SEATTLE YOUTH MAY FIGHT WELSH

Clarence Rothus, the Seattle boy and former P. N.
