

Labor's celebration Monday was one of the best ever held by the workers. The parade was a monster, and the crowd witnessing it larger still. There were five bands, with the German singing societies also giving a concert along the streets. At the stadium following the parade 15,000 persons gathered to witness the carnival of sports. NEED OF CHINESE STATION IS SHOWN

Unless the government soon arranges for a Chinese detention station here as has been asked for by local officials and the city, the authorities at Seattle will have to build a stockade around the one at Seattle to hold all the inmates, according to local immigration officials. At present the Seattle detention station is overflowing with Hindus and Chinese, there being so many that they have to sleep on the floors. The government has been repeatedly asked to locate a Chinese detention station here as most Chinese shipping for the Orient starts from here.

CLIMBERS SHOULD EAT, SAYS BOTANIST

T. J. Stomj, Amsterdam, Holland, famous botanist and mountain climber, returned Saturday from his trip with the other botanists to the top of Mount Tacoma with many criticisms and suggestions for climbing the mountain, different from the method purged by the present guides. The professor insists climbers should be allowed to eat some, which is absolutely prohibited by the guides now. He also wants all members of the party to be roped together.


ESCAPES FROM RESCUE HOME
