

THE IDEAL SCHOOL OF THE FUTURE AND "THE BOY PROBLEM"—ELLA FLAGG YOUNG

ELLA FLAGG YOUNG. What is the problem that is fast overshadowing all others in our cities?

THE BOY PROBLEM. What institution has, perhaps, the largest to do with solving the boy problem?

The schools. What should the school of the future do for the boy to help him cross the pitfalls between 12 and 18?

For an answer to that question the Times went to ELLA FLAGG YOUNG, superintendent of the public schools of Chicago and the most famous today of American experts on primary education.

The following statement was dictated by Mrs. Young to the interviewer of the Times.

By Ella Flagg Young. The ideal school of the future for boys—yes, and for girls, too!—will be one in which not only the brain will be cultivated, but in which children will be taught to use that most wonderful of all known instruments—the hand.

When the "little red school house" was instituted, you know, the United States was new and what there was of it had been built mostly with the hands—the physical force—of our forefathers.

At this time consequently, the need of developing brain power seemed greater than the need of developing further physical power and so every father determined that his child should have this

power that, by the force of his mind, he might direct the work of the hands of others. But he forgot that if we carried this idea to its logical conclusion there would be NO hands to direct some day in the future.

Thus children became imbued with the idea that, while work with the hands was necessary, it was not always dignified and seldom remunerative and should not

be done if one, by any possible means, could avoid it.

So "schooling" then came to mean not the fitting for practical life but the acquisition of that which would perhaps enable the child to live by doing the least possible manual labor.

But the ever-increasing need of money—indeed often of daily bread—brought it about that, despite an elaborate high school filled with teachers of splendid academic excellence, at least nine-tenths of the school children were forced to leave school at 14 to "get a job."

All they have had then, when they found themselves facing life, has been, in the main, theoretical knowledge—trills and furbelows. And so they have not always been able to hold those "jobs" and so they started, many of them, to live by their wits: To live on the streets, preying on whom they might, adding constantly to the "flotsam of the corners."

In the ideal school of the future every child, when he leaves school, provided he stays until he is through grammar grades, will have a specialty by which he can become immediately a really successful wage earner.

Our schools today already try to train minds to concentration. They teach the process of logical thought and now we are adding the practical working out of this thought which, when perfected, will mean the ideal school!

In the ideal school there will be no abstract problems in the early school days of the child. When a boy works at his problems it will be with the added interest of knowing that he may be doing the exact sum that he, as a man, may have to do in his business or trade.

In the ideal school of the future every child, rich and poor alike, will be taught to work with his hands, for I would not deprive any man of the great blessing of being able to do things.

The ideal school of the future will teach that no work is menial because all good work is first mental.

In the ideal school of the future the heads of great factories, industries and commercial houses will become teachers for they will co-operate with the schools in telling just what knowledge is needed in the boy or girl who elects to work at the business in which they have made a success and each year these men will take into their shops and offices the different boys and girls to "finish" their education along the specialized lines it has been started.

I know that this ideal school of the future is coming very soon for already, we in Chicago, have worked out some of its methods of procedure.
