NEW YORK, Sept. 23.—Now is the winter of our discontent about to be made glorious by the plunk of the football. Eastern teams are now well down to practice and the "big nine" conference teams of the middle west will get down to business Saturday.

The conference rules prevent practice before September 20, but things will be set on fire after that date. Taking it through and through, a very enjoyable time is expected to be had by one and all during the coming season. A large crop of new doctors came from the colleges this year, and all are in need of something to do, so the football season may come along about just the right time.

Taking the game seriously, however, Harvard is looked upon to repeat and cop the eastern title. Harvard will have the far-famed Charles Brickley in the lineup again, which means considerable. It may be remembered that Brickley shoots drop kicks over the bar as effectively as an expert gunner might put them over with a six-inch gun and twenty paces. Storer will captain the team. The veterans who must be replaced this year are Wendell, Felton and Gardner. Promising material is on hand for their places, and, in addition, recruit Mahan has taken the field with a reputation for drop kicking second only to that of Brickley.

Yale starts a new system of coaching this year. Howard Jones will take charge of Eli's football hopes for a period of three years, and it is hoped he will establish a system of play as sound as that shown by Percy Haughton, at Harvard. Heretofore, Yale has changed head-coaches annually, except that Walter Camp retained his place as adviser. Camp will continue to act in this capacity with Jones.

Captain Ketcham is the only All-American star in the Yale line-up. Line-men Talbot, Pendleton, Warren, Cooney and Avery of last year's team will again be in their places, but the line will have to be filled out from last year's freshman eleven and the substitutes. Not a single regular member of last year's back field will be on hand. Philbin and Spalding graduated. Lefty Flynn left school. Tommy Cornell, quarter, will probably be shifted to half or fullback. Pumphrey, the substitute back, who gained fame by making the kick which tied the Princeton score last year, Merkle and Castles are expected to take places as regulars.

The Princeton team will be built around Capt. "Hobey" Baker, one of the fastest backs in the east. S. Baker and F. Trankman will also be back this year, and there is a wealth of material from last year's freshmen team to complete the back field. Two big freshmen, Brown and Lambertson, will also probably appear in the varsity line this year. A. Blumenthal and W. G. Andrews, a Tiger end of 1912, will have charge of the coaching this year, and it is up to them to build up practically an entire new team. The only regular line-man to return this year was Phillips, left tackle. Five men who won their letters by substituting in the Yale or Harvard game are back, but only three of the real string men are available. The other positions must be filled by picking from the substitutes, and the 1913 freshmen eleven. Capt. Pendleton is lost to the backfield through graduation, and De Witt through the three-year rule.
