HERDERSON CYCLE MAKES RECORD RUN

Ray E. Day, Tacoma and Northwest agent of the new Henderson four cylinder motorcycle, has received notification of the winning of the big Michigan endurance run by a Henderson machine.

Charles Drude, driving the new machine over 351 miles of heavy sand, came through at the end of the run with a perfect score.

Thirty contestants, representing nearly all makes of motorcycles, ground out the 61 miles between Detroit and Flint, Michigan on the first day. Then the sand was encountered, and one by one the machines dropped out. Only eight machines finished the race. Four of them had perfect scores. Drude, on his 1914 Henderson, with 187.7 miles to his credit the second day out, finished first at the tape with 14 minutes to spare and a score of 1000 per cent. One of the other winners was a Merkle.

The Michigan run is considered one of the hardest motorcycle tests in the United States, on account of the treacherous condition of the roads. Drude gave as his reasons for victory the fact that his machine was equipped with 3-inch tires, long wheelbase, underslung motor suspension and low riding position.

Six Cylinder Cars Cheaper In Long Run, Rays Dealer

Though most motor-car owners and drivers know now the reason for the superiority of the six-cylinder engine, there still are a few who fail to fully appreciate it. They admit the power is greater, but think it merely because of the two extra cylinders. Considered purely from the standpoint of numbers and volume of combustion space, six small cylinders have no more piston area and burn no more gasoline than four large cylinders.

Mr. K. C. Field, sales manager of the Pacific Car company, explained this very clearly to a buyer yesterday. The reason is very simple. As long as there are four divisions in the cycle of operations of a gas engine just so long will it be impossible for four cylinders or a less number to overlap in power. Five cylinders would produce just sufficient power impulses to meet the complete circle of the fly-wheel. But five cylinders would not balance, being an uneven number. Hence there is no four-cycle gasoline motor of less than six cylinders that can possibly produce continuous power. Anything more than six will do so, of course, but there is no necessity of adding more cylinders than are needed, and the larger number of cylinders is not commercially practicable.

Jameson Won the Prize-- Oh, Yes--Sure He Won It

H. E. Jameson, Northwest agent for the Harley Davidson motorcycle, is deeply, terribly peeved.

Not only has he been made the butt of a joke that everyone else but himself can appreciate, but he declares that the two-wheeled speed-cart that he handles for a livelihood has been willfully, designedly insulted. Jameson didn't use these words exactly, but they sound better than what he did say.

In the recent endurance run to Hoquiam, Jameson rode a 1914 Harley-Davidson. The roads were rutty and many riders were so lame from the constant jolting of their machines that they were hardly able to walk after the ride was over. Jameson immediately strutted proudly about, showing how little fatigued he was, and telling of the comfort of riding on the Harley-Davidson full floating seat, featured on the 1914 models.

"And then it happened." Jameson made a perfect score. He went proudly around to see the judges a few days later, and was given his prize—a queerly shaped little package of considerable weight.

He opened the package. It contained a bottle of delicately tinted liquid. Jameson read the label. It had many pretty phrases on it, but most prominent of all were the words, "Horse Liniment"

"Well, if that certainly ain't a mean trick," caustically remarked the nettled agent. "They must have thought I was riding a donkey instead of a '14 Harley with a full floating seat."


