UNIVERSITY ENCOURAGED BY MONEY AID

Encouraged at the prospect of meeting the expenses of conducting the school President Todd of the University of Puget Sound reported today that several Methodist churches had come to the front with various sums that will practically insure the college against financial difficulties. At a meeting of the official board of the First Methodist Episcopal church last night a sum of \$4000 for four years was guaranteed. A collection of \$1000 a year will be taken. The Queen Anne church of Seattle guarantees \$1300 for four years. The Epworth church of Tacoma pledges itself to raise \$2400. The First church of Seattle will contribute \$8000 in four years. This money Dr. Todd said today would go toward paying the maintenance charges and the indebtedness.
