OUTBREAK IS FEARED IN MEXICO

VERA CRUZ, Nov. 6.—Admiral Fletcher, commanding the American naval forces, today deplored the intense excitement prevailing as the result of Lind's confirmation of the reports that Wilson has notified Huerta that he must retire. An anti-American outbreak is feared. In readiness to suppress any outbreak seven American warships are here.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 6.—Disquieting news is believed to have reached the administration. Immediately after reaching his office today, Secretary Bryan rushed to the president, carrying a bundle of dispatches that he had received during the night. A long conference followed.

Bryan was asked whether it was true that Huerta had told O'Shaughnessy that he must continue in office because there was no successor elected. Bryan returned no reply. It is persistently rumored that Huerta had defied the United States. Bryan refused to discuss the report of William Bayard Hale, who investigated conditions in Mexico for the president.

PARIS, Nov. 6.—The foreign office today officially denied the Huerta had asked for French mediation between Mexico and the United States.

LET EMPLOYER REGARD GIRLS AS HIS DAUGHTERS

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 6.—"When I think of men and women fighting for enough wages to keep them alive, it is as if the mockery of life hit me in the face."

Lulu Glaser, vaudeville star, was taking off her make-up. "This problem of the working girl," she said, "is eating the heart out of our nation. The great trouble is ignorance. If the employer would only try to understand his workers—learn how they live—he could never stand out against the living wage. "Would the employer want his daughter sitting eight hours a day at a machine in surroundings such as the factory girls work, for just enough to keep her alive? "If the employer would take that attitude toward working women instead of the 'I pay as much as anybody else' stand, there would soon be co-operation between capital and labor. "Factory girls who fall are not always weak. Most girls know that the longer they work in the factory the less they are worth. When they dare look into the future it is hopeless. "Hopelessness drives the factory girl wrong. She thinks 'What's the use? I'll never be able to earn any of the luxuries of life, so I may as well get them the other way while I am young and have the chance.'"

MISS JOHNSON TO SPEAK IN ALL SCHOOLS

Miss Marjorie Johnson, city pure food inspector, is starting on a big campaign of education. She intends to speak to every school in the city and will start tomorrow to interest the pupils and teachers with a view to interesting the parents. She will then speak to all the women's clubs, the parent-teachers' associations and other organizations.

"By next spring I hope to have such a campaign of education going that dealers will have to cover up their goods to keep their business," said Miss Johnson.
