

# ABERDEEN ELEVEN ARE VIRTUAL STATE CHAMPIONS

## EVERETT'S FAILURE TO BEAT STADIUM SETTLES BIG SEASON

Aberdeen H. S. is today champion of Washington by virtue of the score in the Everett-Stadium game last Saturday. In one of the most bitterly fought games ever held in the Stadium, Everett H. S., erstwhile "champions" of the state, were held to an 0-0 score. Everett was much heavier

than Tacoma, and in line smash was the superior of Stadium. But Stadium had the brains and speed. Because of the leadership of Billy Beymer, Everett failed to score. If Beymer had run the team in the Aberdeen game in this fashion, the score might have been different. Crane and Barck shone for Tacoma. Crane was responsible for most of the end runs and yardage of Tacoma, while Barck downed the Smokestack City warriors whenever necessary. Pringle showed up in fair form, outpunting Guern 10 to 15 yards.

First Half.  
Everett kicked off, the ball was caught by Crane, who was good for 30 yards. With the ball in Everett's hands, the local Blue and Gold line held well, considering the weight of the visitors. The Everett quarter's forward passes were uniformly intercepted. In the second quarter Everett went through the Tacoma line for consistent gains of five yards. By frequent punting the ball swayed from side to side. The Stadium rooters yelled with deafening

noise, and the Everett men replied with vigor. There was much good will between the two stands. The third quarter was evenly contested, but near the end the Tacoma line succeeded in smashing through the Everett team for good gains. The fourth quarter was clearly Tacoma's. Beymer and Crane brought the ball within Everett's yard line twice. However, Everett got hold of the ball and punted to safer localities. The game ended with the ball in striking distance of the Blue and Gold line. Everett was all in, while Stadium could have lasted nicely for another quarter. The Stadium team was undoubtedly the stronger, in spite of lack of weight.

The fact that Tacoma is running up for the state championship is sufficient proof of Coach Perkins' power of building such a strong team out of only four veterans.



## DARK HORSE TEAMS MAY HAVE PLAYERS ON ALL-AMERICAN

With the football season about half gone, two practically unknown elevens stand out head and shoulders over teams which have for years become household names.

These teams are from the Michigan Agricultural college and Pittsburg university, which, respectively, humbled Michigan and Wisconsin, Cornell and Carleisle.

The victories of the Michigan Aggies over Michigan and Wisconsin came because the farmers played better football. There was no suggestion of flukes. For the first time the Aggies will have men on the mythical All-Western and possibly by some freak of chance on the All-American eleven.

Julian, the wonderful plunging fullback, and Blake Miller, half back, are the chief cogs in the machine that Coach Macklin used to lower the colors of the Wolverines and Badgers.

Julian is one of the greatest fullbacks in football. He proved his worth against Michigan by scoring one of the touchdowns that beat Yost's eleven, and a week later outplayed the veteran Tanberg of Wisconsin, picked last season as the All-Conference fullback. The only rival the big blonde has for honors is Eichenlaub of Notre Dame, one of the greatest the game ever produced.

Blake Miller is a brilliant broken field runner, carrying the ball splendidly behind the interference devised by Macklin. His rival is Oliphant, the great Purdue halfback who, in the opinion of "Hurry Up" Yost, is the best in the west.

Julian and Miller are stars in using or breaking up forward passes. They are strong defensive players, their tackling being low, hard and clean.

In a line that is adamant from

end to end Capt. Gifford stands out prominently. He has outplayed every tackle he has met this year. Opposite Gifford is a great negro player, G. E. Smith, who played All-Western Tackle Butler to a standstill in the M. A. C.-Wisconsin game.
