The Japanese handed over \$6 in change. Then, as he was ordered to "beat it," he was propelled by a vigorous kick from one of the hold-ups. The Japanese, reporting the hold-up to the police later, complained more severely of the ungentle kick than of the loss of his money.

BUILD VIADUCTS HERE SOON

mouthful. Your waist or chest should be about eight inches from the board. When not actively occupied in the business of eating, the hands should lie quietly in the lap. I have in mind a friend who was once greatly embarrassed because she had impressed this so carefully on her little girl. The first time baby was invited out and allowed to come to the "grown-up table" she looked about in horror and surprise at the elbows on the table and the "fiddling hands" fingering the glasses and forks of the others at the table. She stood it as long as she could and then raised her voice accusingly: "Put your paddles in your lap." A gentleman never seats himself at table until after his hostess is seated. Whether she is a great lady of fashion, or his mother, sister or wife. Convention says that everything possible should be eaten with a fork. This includes ices, melons and salads, as well as fish, meat and vegetables. Never cut lettuce with a knife. Lettuce leaves are folded with the fork and then conveyed to the mouth. Never hold your knife or fork in your hand while finishing a conversation. Neither must you mash your food between the prongs and then convey it to the mouth. Use a small piece of bread instead of your knife to help put food on your fork. If you should pass your plate for a second helping say both knife and fork across your plate.
