

TAILOR SHOP BROKEN INTO; CLOTH GONE

Burglars last night broke into the tailoring shop of Noble & Reichardt, 609 South 11 street, within half a block of the county court house, and carried off cloth worth \$500.

The shop is located in a small one-story frame building adjoining the alley between Tacoma avenue and G street, facing 11th street, and it is believed that the burglars drove a wagon up to the back door and filled it with the most valuable cloth and materials in the place. The loot was too heavy for a man to carry away unless he made several trips. Entrance to the shop was gained by breaking a panel of the back door of the shop, and reaching inside to turn the bolt.

City Detective Lloyd Kincaid worked on the case today. It is believed that persons living in the vicinity of the shop committed the robbery.

REGISTRATION REACHES 14,000

Registration for the bond election today reached 14,713. Last spring the total was but 13,015, but 56 were added for the park board election and 672 have been put on in the last few weeks. It is expected the registration will go above the 16,000 mark before the bond vote December 30.

HUERTA IS ON A DRUNKEN SPREE

VERA CRUZ, Nov. 22.—(By Staff Correspondent.)—An illuminating explanation of President Wilson's indifference toward Huerta's various exhibitions of fire-eating was furnished the United Press from a source that is unquestionably reliable. It is simply that Huerta is drinking heavily lately and that on several occasions it is reported he has reached a stage of actual irresponsibility. These outbursts, it is said, have been occurring frequently.

Realizing the unimportance of a drunkard's ebullitions the Washington administration hasn't thought it worth while to notice them. Both Lind and O'Shaughnessy, it is understood, have referred to the dictator's habits in messages to Washington and the administration is receiving daily reports concerning his condition.
