The Home-Trade Show

Like the famous educational congress of Boston, the Home Trade show of Tacoma is destined to be a great factor in educating the people on what to buy and what to eat.

One of the most interesting and most important exhibits of the whole show which opened last night and will continue all week, is that by the city.

The electrical cooking is the thing the people are coming to here rapidly, but even more important is that of the municipal show which shows what to cook or rather what not to. For the city and the state have co-operated in setting before the city an optical demonstration of some of the impure and rotten stuff that is sold to eat.

Old baked beans that should have been thrown away years ago but which were found on the shelves of merchants; "chicken tamales" that never knew chicken; meats treated with "freezum" and meats not treated so citizens can see the difference; fish that was rotten when it was canned and a variety of the common edibles that are not good are shown by the city.

In this day of canned food the citizen is practically at the mercy of the manufacturer and dealer unless he knows the good from the bad. This show is causing people to do a lot of thinking. The state and city inspectors are doing their best to protect the public, but their efforts are tremendously handicapped.

A good look at the Home Trade show exhibit of the city is enough to show any citizen that there has got to be a new campaign for pure food. It will probably end in prohibiting the sale of all prepared foods not government inspected and stamped when canned.

This is gradually getting to a paternal and socialistic scheme of things, but certain it is the people do not want to eat the kind of stuff shown in the Tacoma booth at the Home Trade Show, and which lots of them are having palmed off on them today.

How Many Babies?

Humanity Depends upon Soil


The absolute dependence of the modern city upon transportation and upon the farm was strikingly illustrated by the recent blizzard which isolated a number of communities along the great lakes.

The storm fell almost without warning. Snowfall and wind had been forecasted, but it was an avalanche which came. Trains were stalled, street cars stopped, wire service suspended and almost a complete paralysis of the incoming of food supplies followed.

This was most keenly felt in the item of milk. No city carries a reserve stock of milk. From cow to consumer must be a matter of only a few hours. In these isolated cities were thousands of infants who relied for sustenance upon the udder of the out-of-town bossy. Adults had quickly to forego their usual use of milk in the interest of childhood. And at that, the margin of escape from infant starvation in many homes was so narrow as to be agonizing in its hazard.

There was given, by this swift storm, a new sense of the social value of honest food storage. It was the stored food which saved thousands from starvation. The stored reserve fortunately proved adequate for the short interval of isolation. But had that interval been prolonged for only a few additional days, famine could not have been averted. The boastful city is at the country's mercy. Humanity depends upon the soil.


