### World's Most Celebrated Dancer Describes His Latest Creation

(Editor's Note—After describing for the readers of the Times the newest and most popular dances of the season, M. Maurice,

the world's greatest ballroom dancer, has written today especially for the Times this article on how to dance his NEW dance—the attractive dance which he and Miss Walton have just originated and are beginning to teach their society pupils.)

This dance hasn't yet been seen on any stage. Miss Walton and I have only just originated it and it is still without a name. But it is so fascinating a step that we, who dance all day from noon till nearly dawn, are always ready and eager to try our "new dance" just once more!

It can be danced to any two-part ragtime music. The easiest way to get this time is to remember that there is a rising and falling of the shoulders corresponding to the movement of the feet.

Some of the principal steps we have taken from the tango, the maxixe and the cakewalk.

The dance starts with eight plain walking steps, in the position which we have posed in Figure 1.

After these eight bars, we drop into the old polka step, with the modern addition of two movements of the hip to each step. The gentleman starts to the left with left-right, turning at the same time so that when he copitates the step right-left-right he advances in the same direction.

Then we slide four times to the left with the body bent in the direction of the movement, and then four times to the right. This is

once repeated, followed by eight bars of the habanera step.

Then the gentleman folds his arms across his chest, and the lady, folding hers, rests them on his. In this position they describe a large circle in plain two-step measure.

This is repeated, the couple separating and each dancing singly in a long circle. Coming back to him with her folded arms again resting on his, the lady bends slowly her right knee, extending the left leg backwards until it touches the ground. The gentleman, of course, kneels at the same time; but his left knee is bent and his right extended. They kneel thus in a series of little jerky movements one jerk to each beat of the music.

Then they two-step once again separately, turning back to back and returning so as to face each other. The gentleman stops, and the lady dances half way around again, so that her back is to

him. He takes her hands as in Figure 2, and they make three running steps, first to the right, ending in a long glide as shown in Figure 2, and then to the left.

Then they go back to the step which I described as the "habanera" and dance this for sixteen measures. The dance finishes with a regular old-fashioned cakewalk, the lady facing in the same direction as the gentleman and turning on the last beat to drop in front of him in a graceful curtsy.
