Many business houses gave turkeys and other Thanksgiving dinners to their employees. The Carstens Packing company gave a turkey to each employee and the widows of former employees. Thanksgiving church services were largely attended.

TWO DEATHS IN FAMILY YESTERDAY

Thanksgiving day was marred in Tacoma for one family yesterday by a most unusual and tragic coincidence.

Mrs. Mary Anderson, a widow, age 63, died at her home, 3582 East 1 street, late yesterday afternoon. Her daughter, Mrs. C. P. Larson, gave birth to a child five hours later, and the child, living less than an hour, also died.

It is believed that the shock of her mother's death to Mrs. Larson affected the infant. Both funerals will be held at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning from the residence, with interment in Tacoma cemetery. Hoska-Buckley-King company will have charge.

WOULD PREVENT PUBLICATION OF PAPER

LONDON, Nov. 23.—Prompted by the recent threats of suppressing the suffragette on account of her startling series of articles on sexual diseases, Miss Christabel Pankhurst, in the current issue, prints a spirited defense of her action.

"These articles have simply told the truth about sexual diseases, the extent to which they ravage the population, the reasons why they exist, the manner in which they can be prevented, prevention being, as has been carefully shown, the only real cure," she says. "Where is the indecency in all this? That the existence of sexual disease and the immorality that is its cause are indecent we are the first to admit. But to tell the truth about such evils and to fight for their abolition is the most decent thing that is possible for human beings to do."

NEW WIDE TIRE LAW IN EFFECT JANUARY FIRST

Pierce county wagon owners will have to begin to get ready for the new wide tire law which goes into effect January 1. E. T. Short has been appointed county inspector to enforce the law.

The wide tire is to preserve the roads and enable the hauling of heavier loads, experiments showing that it takes from 12 to 41 per cent more power to draw the same load on average roads with a 1 1/2 inch tire than with a 3-inch tire.

After December only 1,600 pounds may be hauled on a 2-inch tire, 3,200 pounds on a 2 1/2 inch tire, 5,000 pounds for 3-inch tires, 6,800 for 4-inch tires, 8,700 for 5-inch tires and 10,400 pounds for a 6-inch tire.

Anyone carrying heavier loads than these will be prosecuted.

EQUIP COLLEGE TO EARN A LIVING

CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 23.—"The idea now is to turn a college man out at his graduation equipped to make a living," said Dean Matthews, secretary of Western Reserve university when interviewed today by a United Press correspondent in reference to the new "real estate" department of the college—the first university offering instruction in the real estate business to its students. Not only will the theory of real estate selling—the old story of unearned increment which accrues to the land holder and other bookish angles of the business—be taught, but practical real estate dealers will tell the students how to lead a prospective buyer into a vacant lot and paint a picture to him of the prospective palatial dwelling that is to surround it—and secure the first installment.

CONGRESS' NEGLECT BLAMED FOR DISEASE

For the 55,000 school children in the District of Columbia there are 13 medical inspectors, of whom two are dentists. When congress was asked for nine additional inspectors, including a chief, the reply was one inspector at \$500 per annum. There are six veterinarians for the inspection of 1,175 dairy farms stocked with 17,457 cattle, not to mention the job of inspecting 25 slaughter houses. The inadequate provision against preventable diseases in Washington is attributable to the neglect of congress. The citizens of Washington have no vote.

TRAIN GOING AT 60-MILE RATE GETS NEWS

SCRANTON, Pa., Nov. 23.—Newspapers and scientific publications throughout America and Europe are telegraphing or cabling the Scranton Times and officials of the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western railroad today for data and photographs concerning yesterday's experiment by which 250 words of the United Press report were dispatched by wireless from the Times and received on a Lackawanna train running 60 miles an hour. President Truesdale of the Lackawanna is now to receive the entire United Press report as a further experiment.

IN MEXICO CITY BY JANUARY

EL PASO, Nov. 23.—Rebel leaders at Juarez predicted today that Carranza would be in Mexico City by January 1. They said that he would not wait there long to establish a provisional government, however. Either today or tomorrow, it is believed, he will announce his choice of a regular capital in Northern Mexico and that the organization of a formal government may follow immediately.
