Sheriff Tom Foster and his deputy, John Berry of Lewis county, returning here today. Sheriff Close of Cowlitz and his deputies went home last night. Extra precaution was taken in the towns along the railroad to locate Donnelly, all the night marshals and deputy sheriffs being on watch.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 8.—San Domingo has sent a vigorous protest to Washington on the proposed plan of the United States to send observers to that country during the elections December 15, in order to see that a fair election is held.

DUBLIN STRIKE STILL IN AIR

DUBLIN, Dec. 8.—After 20 hours' constant wrangling, a conference committee adjourned yesterday, unable to settle the Dublin strike. The strikers demanded complete reinstatement of all workers, and the employers flatly refused to reinstate more than 80 per cent of the strikers.

VERONE TRIAL IS ON BEFORE CLIFFORD

Trial of Savario Verone, the aged Italian held since last summer for the death of his son-in-law, Augustine Trevano, whom he is alleged to have shot in cold blood while he was tending his garden, began before Judge Clifford today. The task of selecting a jury is expected to last several days. During the entire morning session today only two talesmen were examined.

Harry C. Mahaffey was challenged and excused from the jury box because he was prejudiced. Albert Anderson, a contractor, the second talesman, also said that he was prejudiced. This statement, together with an argument whether or not the anti-capital punishment law might affect Verone, since it was passed after the alleged murder occurred, caused a wordy battle that lasted nearly all day. Attorney Frank Kelly is defending Verone. Special Deputy Prosecutor James O'Brien is prosecuting the prisoner.

197 ARE SAVED

BALTIMORE, Md., Dec. 8.—Wireless dispatches received today stated that the steamer Quermore, bound for Liverpool, had rescued 197 passengers from another steamer burning at sea 500 miles from Diamond Shoals. The Quermore, with other vessels, caught wireless calls for assistance at 2 o'clock Sunday morning, and reached the burning vessel two hours later. They first reported the vessel to be the Malory liner Rio Grande, but officials of the company denied the report, saying that the Rio Grande did not carry passengers. According to the wireless reports, the passengers were lowered in lifeboats and transferred to the Quermore without excitement.

LONDON, Dec. 8.—Mr. and Mrs. Francis B. Sayre arrived in London yesterday and were driven at once to the home of Ambassador Page. They will make their home with the Page family during their stay in London.

(Continued From Page 1) international boundary an hour after the war was declared, under full speed, horse, foot, dragons, motor cars and aviators. The invading nation had to have time to concentrate into the group of fortresses over which Hawkins and I circled in our airplane on my first scouting flight. So ten thousand men took six hours in which to die; and even at that the oncoming host its infantry in motor cars killing time that the cavalry might keep up, swept down on the town on the heels of 25,000 of the rearguard, sweeping them in as a water's brush sweeps crumbs, and closed up the neck of the peninsula. The 25,000 would never have got in if the 10,000 had not consumed those six hours in dying. Blood was well expended for delay—according to the principles of war.

that this Flying Column was rightly so called, as it was one of the largest aerial armies ever mobilized. Every eye in the two camps, and in the small army of camp-followers like myself, was scanning the horizon for the first sight of the aerial host. When it should try to overpass the lines and throw itself into the besieged city, the crisis would be on. For the whole danger of the place lay in the diminished numbers of the defenders. Supplies they had in plenty, ammunition and material of war in plenty; but the thin line in the trenches spoke pitifully of those who had died in the breaches, sorties and reconnaissances of that wonderful defense. Thus were arranged the pieces in the game when Hawkins and I

took the air in our biplane for our first examination of my fearful assignment.
