

Attorney Metzger, representing Jackson, entered a demurrer to the complaint, saying that the charge was not properly drawn up, but was overruled. Judge Clifford permitted Jackson's bondman to withdraw the cash bond of \$5,000 and substitute a bail bond for the same amount.

# AUTOMOBILE RUNS AWAY FROM DRIVER

Becoming excited after a west-bound cable car No. 82 had grazed the side of his machine, K. Kinai, Japanese, chauffeur of the delivery automobile of the Eagle steam laundry, lost control of his machine at 11th and D streets this morning. The heavy delivery auto careened towards the curb, running down the steep grade of 11th street at a terrific speed. The wild-eyed Japanese chauffeur clung to his seat and seemed unable to turn the wheel. After dashing down hill 50 yards, the automobile leaped over a curb, crashed through an apple-elder stall annexed to the Public Market, and finally came to a stop against the wall of a dwelling behind the stall. The older stall was demolished and the automobile was damaged to the extent of several hundred dollars.

# CITY READY TO SETTLE WITH M' HUGH

The city council arranged to settle the P. E. McHugh judgment this morning. A special water fund for the \$42,000 will be created and bonds issued on the fund. They will be paid at the rate of probably \$3,000 a month from water receipts. Mr. Beal is of the opinion that his family nag can go fast enough for all practical purposes.
