## Ford's Plan is to Divide Millions With His Employees

DETROIT, Mich., Jan. 10.—In announcing his purpose to divide half the profits of the Ford Motor company with his 20,000 or more employees, the plan to go into effect with the first 1914 payday on January 12, Henry Ford said in his statement:


"It will be the greatest revolution in the matter of rewards for workers ever known in the industrial world.

"At one stroke, the new plan will reduce the hours of labor from nine to eight and add in every man's pay a share of the profits of the house. The smallest amount to be received by any man 22 years old and upwards will be \$5 per day. The minimum wage is now \$2.34 per day of nine hours.

"All but 10 per cent of the employees will at once share in the profits. Only 10 per cent of the men now employed are under 22, and even every one of those under 22 will have a chance of showing himself entitled to \$5 per day. Instead of waiting until the end of the year to make a distribution of profits among their employees in one lump bonus sum, Mr. Ford and Mr. Couzens (secretary-treasurer) have estimated the year's prospective business and have decided on what they feel will be a safe amount to reward the workers, which will be spread over the whole year and paid on the regular semi-monthly paydays.

"The factory is now working two shifts of nine hours each. This will be changed to three shifts of eight hours each. The number employed now is about 15,000 and this will be increased by 4,000 or 5,000. The men who now earn \$2.34 per day of


