

NEW MOVIE PICTURE HOUSE FOR TACOMA

A place to check babies and bundles will be provided for the tired shopper at the new "movie" theater to be built by John S. Baker on C street adjoining the Tacoma theater, for Eugene Levy of Seattle and John Siefert of Tacoma. The new photo-play house will cost \$100,000 and be the finest on the Pacific coast.

The idea to check babies and parcels originated with Mr. Siefert. To carry out the scheme the ladies retiring room will be made larger than first planned and a maid will be kept constantly in attendance. Here may be left the burdens of womankind while the owners enjoy the show. The men will not be forgotten as a sumptuous smoking room will be fitted up. This room, however, will have no accommodations for babies.

The plans for the new show house call for concrete and steel throughout, making it absolutely fireproof. A newly patented system of ventilation connecting with a huge fan on the roof will insure pure, fresh air all the time. No mechanical music will be used but because of the long hours two shifts of musicians will be employed made up of the best musical talent obtainable. A \$30,000 pipe organ similar, to but larger than, the instrument now in use in the First Presbyterian church in Seattle, has been ordered. It has the echo attachment which consists of small sweetly toned pipes for the rear of the house. "We will rush the work just as fast as we can," said Mr. Siefert.


