

REILLY DEFENDS ACTION OF SMELTER STRIKERS AND ANSWERS JAMIESON

In defense of the striking ore handlers of the Tacoma smelter, and in challenge to statements recently published by Sheriff Jamieson, Organizer Thomas Reilly of the Western Federation of Miners made the following statement today:

"I am asking you in fairness to the public and to myself to publish the following statement of affairs in connection with the strike of the workmen at the Tacoma smelter: "In the first place, Sheriff Jamieson has gone out of his way to prejudice, if possible, by various articles in the daily press, the minds of the public in regard to the strikers in general and myself in particular. "The reason that the men quit was that their hours were increased from 9 to 10 with a cut in wages. "To show the prejudice against the strikers brought about by the action of Sheriff Jamieson and Mayor Pratt of Ruston, I will note the following: "When the attorneys who were hired to defend the men who were arrested for carrying concealed weapons attempted to see their clients they were denied admission to the county jail until they proceeded legally to compel
